

DEATH CLAIMS PIONEER WHEN MOUNT PASSES

Silverton—Dr. Hugh S. Mount, who passed away of heart trouble at the Oregon City Emergency hospital Tuesday evening was a son of Mrs. Rebekah Mount of Liberty Hill.

Dr. Mount was born on the old Mount farm at Bethany on the Silverton-Salem highway 51 years ago the 29th of next August, and was the seventh of 14 children. 11 of them surviving him. At the time of his death he was president of the Clackamas county division of the American Red Cross; the Elks lodge, the Masonic order, the Al Kader Shrine temple, fellow in the American College of Surgeons, member of the city of Portland and the counties of Multnomah and Clackamas medical associations.

Last year he was president of the Oregon state medical society and president of the Portland academy of medicine and before this he was county chairman of the Republican central committee.

Mrs. Mount passed away four years ago last Thanksgiving day. He leaves his 18 year old son, Hugh, Junior, his mother, Mrs. Rebekah Mount of Silverton, and the following sisters and brothers: Beverly of Spokane, Mrs. Clara Chamberlain of Portland, Mrs. Eva Wolford of Silverton, Orville, attorney at law, Mrs. Minnie Hall, Portland, Mrs. Nona Kinney of Salmon, Nevada, Mrs. Guy, Clyde and Albert of Oregon City, Robert of Portland. Funeral date is pending the arrival of two of his brothers, but he will be laid to rest by the side of his wife in Riverview cemetery in Portland.

OLD PIONEER WOMAN GIVEN BIG BIRTHDAY

Boena Crest—Mrs. Rebecca B. Jones celebrated her 79th birthday at Fair Acres, home of her son, Bruce Jones, recently. All of her children were present except J. Ben Jones, who is postmaster at Brogan, and was unable to come.

Mrs. Jones comes from an old pioneer family. Her parents, William and Mary Larkins started in Oregon in the 40's from Illinois with several horses and a herd of cattle. By the time they reached Laurel hill or the seven mile hill near The Dalles, the last of their horses died, some having been killed by the Indians, and for the rest of the trip, Mrs. Larkins and her two small children rode on a cow. The Larkins took a donation land claim at Old Wacunda, about a mile south of the present town of Gervais. It was there that Rebecca Larkins was born on July 1, 1850.

On February 4, 1868, Rebecca Larkins married Silas Jones, son of S. W. R. Jones, also a pioneer family. To this union was born 11 children, seven of whom are living, three girls, Miss Lizzie Massey, Mary, who died in infancy, and Mrs. Lillian Hubbs, and eight boys, Bruce, William, Joe, Ben, Burke, Harry, Mark and Reese. Burke was drowned at the age of 17. Harry died of spinal meningitis and was buried at sea, and Joe was killed a few years ago near Independence when the auto in which he was riding was struck by a train. There are 36 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Silas Jones lived nearly all their lives in Marion county. After Silas Jones' death in 1914, Mrs. Jones lived in Brooks, and the last few years she has lived with her son, Bruce, at Fair Acres and her daughter, Mrs. Lizzie Massey, at Quincy. Mrs. Rebecca Jones walks with a cane as she has been crippled since a child, but apparently enjoys good health.
