

CONSUL'S WIFE UNDER ARREST FOR SMUGGLING

San Francisco (UP)—Mrs. Ying Kao, wife of the Chinese vice consul here, was arrested Friday on charges of smuggling opium.

The arrest of the Chinese woman came under suspicion last week when she landed in San Francisco. A search of her trunk disclosed approximately \$600,000 worth of opium, and other contraband.

The woman's husband, Chinese vice consul here, and Chancellor Sun Poon of the Chinese consulate, also were arrested and apprehension of at least eight others, said to be prominent Chinese merchants here, was predicted by George Hatfield, United States attorney.

A significant phase of the arrest is that all were charged with violation of the Jones-Miller act which provides only for deportation. No charge under the Harrison narcotic act was made.

It is pointed out that deportation of the Chinese by the United States permits a trial in China under Chinese law and that death for opium smuggling in that country is not uncommon.

Mid-Westerners Are Most Recent Victims Drake Estate Fraud

London (UP)—The "Drake Estate", said to be worth sums ranging from \$66,000,000 to \$350,000,000 is a myth. Attempts to interest Americans in claiming them are fraudulent, records here indicate.

There are no crown jewels, loot of raids on the Spanish Main and valued at more than a million dollars. There is no such sum as \$18,000,000 lying hidden in the vaults of the Bank of England. There is no Drake castle in Devonshire. In fact, there is no Drake property anywhere which trusting claimants can claim.

These are the conclusions drawn by the United Press correspondent after extensive search through dusty old files and records dating back many years. Inquiries after the Drake estate among lawyers, realtors, and at banks were ridiculed and met by the unanimous answer: "There is no such thing."

So far as can be ascertained from history, Sir Francis Drake, English sea-dog, quasi-pirate, and hero of the Spanish Armada's defeat, married twice. There were no children of either marriage and what little money Drake had, after paying for his numerous expeditions and raids, was left to his wife and brother. It amounted to a scant \$200,000.

Yet now a mysterious individual called Oscar Hartzell, said to be living in London, but of whom no trace can be found, claims that he has found the true heir of the so-called Drake estate.

Hartzell says he is representing Col. Dexter Drake, who, because he is rich enough already, has given Hartzell title to the estate. Hartzell claims that the estate is worth \$22,500,000,000 and that after it is paid Americans, particularly citizens of southern Minnesota and northern Iowa, where many descendants of Drake are said to be living, who have "donated" to a fund to pay expenses of settlement, will be paid as high as \$7,000 for every \$1 "donated."

Authorities and experts in this country declare that Hartzell's scheme is just a revival of the "Drake Millionaire" fraud in which American interest was first stimulated. It is believed, in 1902, and which has bobbed up at intervals ever since.

TOWN SUBMERGED BY KANSAS FLOOD

Lyons, Kas. (AP)—The entire population of Saxman, a small town southeast of Lyons, Friday afternoon was reported marooned by flood waters of Cow creek on top of the two-story building in the village.

One row boat available here was taken immediately to Saxman by truck.

Saxman has a population of slightly more than 100.

GEORGIA HOLDS MASS MEETING FOR CRIME CUT

Atlanta, Ga. (UP)—A mass meeting of citizens of Georgia has been called by Gov. L. G. Hardman in one of the most unusual attempts to reduce crime ever made by an American governor.

At the meeting to be held in the state capitol, action is due to be taken by appointment of committees from branches of the state legislature and from citizens generally to "accumulate information which will be available to the members of general assembly at the next session."

Supreme Court Justice S. Price Gilbert was named chairman of the meeting, and B. T. Castellow, a circuit solicitor general, secretary.

In announcing the plan "to relieve the tendency toward crime and reduce crime among our young people," Gov. Hardman said: "I am impressed by the great number of crimes that are being committed in our state, and by the need of studying our criminal laws."

"In view of the number of letters that I have received from citizens and grand juries over the state asking that some plan be put into operation by which our laws could be made more effective, I hereby call a meeting of citizens of Georgia."

"Every citizen is invited to be present at this general meeting and especially the members of the general assembly... attorneys at law and the judges and solicitors of our various courts."

"I shall ask that such action be taken as seems wise and advisable in the way of appointing committees from each branch of the general assembly and from citizens for the purpose of accumulating information which will be available to the members of the general assembly at the next session."

BREAKDOWNS UNCONSCIOUSLY SOUGHT, CLAIM

St. Louis, (UP)—It isn't work alone but rather the desire to escape from the conflict of life that causes nervous breakdowns, according to Dr. George R. Dodson, professor of philosophy at Washington university here. He believes that every breakdown is unconsciously desired.

"The ordinary man or woman who has happiness or love, no matter how hard he works, will never go into the hands of the receiver," Dr. Dodson said. "The girl or boy will never break down from study alone. But let the child be oppressed with fear of failure or the fear of criticism from his parents and a conflict is set up. Then the body is prepared for a breakdown."
