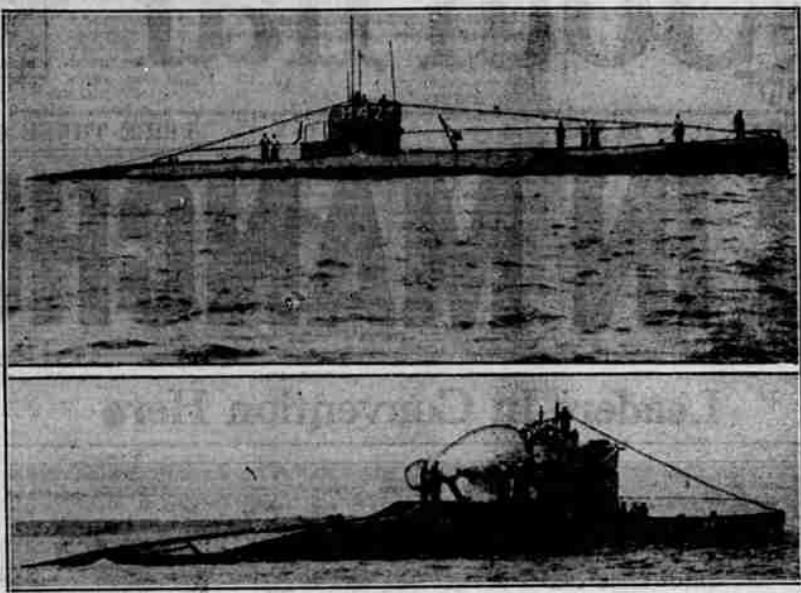

Mrs. Wilde was prominent in church affairs, being an active member of the St. Ann's society, whose members acted as guard of honor at the funeral.
