

PICNIC PARTY PLUNGES INTO RIVER FROM FERRY

LOSS OF LIFE PREVENTED BY CREW'S ACTION

Woodburn—An accident occurred at the Wilsonville ferry Sunday afternoon which might have resulted in a serious loss of life as a car containing five people backed down the hill on the south side of the river and into 20 feet of water.

The car was a sedan and was driven by a Mrs. Laws of Portland, who was accompanied by her son and daughter and two girl friends. After crossing the ferry, Mrs. Laws started her car up the steep hill on the south bank but killed her engine when about half way up and losing her presence of mind was unable to stop the backward descent of the car into the water.

The two girls managed to jump out as the car started backward but the driver and her son and daughter went down with the machine. In some way Mrs. Laws managed to open the car door under the water and came to the top twice and was unconscious when taken from the river. Life preservers were thrown from the ferry and with the help of the ferryman and two passengers, who luckily were attired in bathing suits, the three were rescued.
