Dayton—Henry Chapman, 88, a resident of Dayton for 26 years died at his home in Dayton Sunday after several months of illness due to old age. He was a cabinet maker.

Chapman was born in New Haven, Ohio in 1840 and was married there to Miss Eliza T. Snyder in April, 1861, who died in March 1928, lacking but a few days of being 67 years. He is survived by one son and three daughters, Mrs. Alice Hord, Portland; L. S. Chapman, Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. Nellie Spangle and Mrs. Eva L. Baxter, Dayton, Ore. He was a member of A. F. & A. M. and M. W. A. lodge of Dayton.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon at the Dayton Methodist church under direction of Macy and son, McMinnville, Rev. Walter G. Smith, Dayton, officiating. Burial services were by the Masonic lodge at the Dayton I. O. O. F. cemetery.
