

FUNERAL RITES FOR WOODBURN RESIDENT HELD

Woodburn—Funeral services for Mrs. Gertrude Lindebe Truller, who passed away at her home on Young street Monday, were held at the Lutheran church in Woodburn Wednesday afternoon. Rev. H. Rosen of Monitor, officiating. Music was by Mrs. Rosen and Mrs. W. J. Lindebe of Salem, with Miss Agnes Jure at the organ. Pall bearers were J. W. Freeman, O. M. Anonby, H. Palmes of Woodburn, C. Larsen of Monitor, Andrew Stee and Ed Knutson of Silverton. Interment was in Belle Pass cemetery.

Grethe Lindebe Truller was born in Arnesdal, Norway, on January 8, 1861 and was 68 years old at the time of her death. On February 11, 1883 she was united in marriage to Emmanuel Nelson of Norway and with her husband emigrated to America in 1870, arriving at Forest City, Iowa, where they made their home for several years. Later they moved to Decorah, Iowa, where Mr. Nelson was accidentally killed in 1885. On November 11, 1885, Mrs. Nelson was married to O. L. Truller, who owned a farm near Forest City, where they made their home until 1914, when they moved to Woodburn, Oregon, where they have since resided.
