After winning four straight games, the Salem Senators Sunday took one on the chin when they met the Mount Scott Tigers at Olinger field. The contest was anybody's battle up until the ninth. In that stanza the visitors ran in six scores to make the final count 9 to 3.

Meyers, pitching for the locals, went fairly well until the sixth. The Tigers had gotten but three hits and two runs off his delivery up until that time. The mountain side added a run in the sixth and in the seventh and eighth Meyers was able to jerk himself out of tight positions to hold the visitors scoreless. However in the ninth he removed himself from the game after five runs had been scored. Manager Edwards wanted Meyers to continue in the box but when Umpire Harvey called one a ball that Meyers thought was a strike, he took this opportunity to walk to the showers. Edwards sent Sullivan in to pitch and moved Hafendfeldt over to first while Hawk went to third. Sullivan managed to retire the side with but one more runner coming in.

Harris, former Albany twirler, pitched for Mt. Scott. He did a good job of it too, holding the locals to six hits. He did not allow a hit in five of the nine innings. Quinn scored twice in the first. Quinn drew a walk and went to third on a passed ball. Lamb hoisted one into right field for four bases scoring Quinn. From this inning until the sixth the solons got but one hit, the batters going down in one, two, three order. In the sixth Lamb got a freak two base hit over Cox's head, went to third on Bigbee's sacrifice fly and came home Sullivan's three bagger. In the remaining innings Salem did not threaten.

Mt. Scott scored twice in the second when Caulkins hit a three bagger, bringing in L. Girod and Messenger. Another run was added in the sixth. Buono scoring from second on L. Girod's two base smash.

In the ninth the fireworks started. Messenger, the first man up, hit for four bases into left. Caulkins was hit for the second time and went to second on Meyers' out. Scales got a single into left, and went to second on the throw to the plate in an effort to get Caulkins. P. Girod drove one deep into center field for three bases, scoring Scales and Caulkins. Russell then sent P. Girod one better and hit a home run in the same locally, scoring P. Girod. Buono was given a free ticket to first and promptly stole second. The road was getting to rough for Meyers so he bid his fellow players adieu and went to the showers, while Billy Sullivan went in. He fanned Cox. Buono scored on L. Girod's two base hit to left. Messenger went out. Hawk to first.

The Salem team lacked the pep it has been displaying during the last half of the season, while the comparatively small crowd of spectators sat and looked on listlessly.

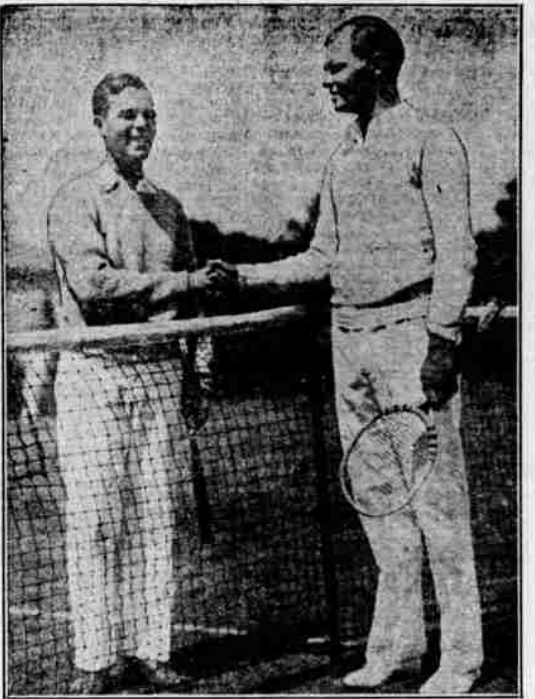

"Lively" Ball Should Be Deadened, Is Belief Western League Clubs

Kansas City (UP)—The "lively" ball is far from popular with managers of western league clubs—in fact the managers are almost in agreement with "Chick" Fraser, Pittsburgh Pirate scout, who interrupted his "ivory hunt" long enough to declare:

"I'll say, first, last and always that it is a lousy idea—the lively ball has spoiled the game by taking away all scientific features of hitting, base running and sacrifice bunting."

Not all Western league games are played with the "lively" ball, according to the managers. Almost invariably when "dead" balls are furnished, the game is much better than those in which the "lively" ball is used, they said.

Dale Gear, president of the western league and western association, heads the list of opponents of the continuance of the present baseball, declaring the "lively" ball cuts down base running and good infield work.

Nick Allen, manager of the Tulsa Oilers, predicted the present ball would be deadened 50 per cent next season. "Baseball with a lively ball," he said, "is just a game of cut and slice. It hurts the pitching and the infield doesn't have a chance to move before the ball hurries by."

"Lefty" Liefeld, Oklahoma City manager, blames the lively ball for the decrease in attendance at minor league games in recent years.

COCHET'S PLAY CINCHES TITLE FOR FRANCE

Paris. (AP)—Thanks chiefly to that little tennis machine, Henri Cochet, the Davis cup, emblem of world team supremacy, will remain in France for another year.

The pick of United States' talent, hopeful of recapturing the cup lost to the tri-color in 1927, stormed the French tennis ramparts when they appeared weakest, only to fail back, defeated almost single-handedly by Cochet's mastery.

In a challenge round decided by three matches to two, Cochet accounted for two of the three French victories and walked off the courts of Roland Garros stadium the undisputed hero of the series.

With the score standing two matches to one against them, the Americans had no more than an outside chance to pull the series out of the fire when the final day's play began Sunday. Big Bill Tilden, himself a heroic figure in many a Davis cup combat, came through in gallant fashion, trouncing Jean Borotra, weaker half of the French team, 4-6, 6-1, 6-4, 7-5.

The tall Philadelphia's victory squared the series and left the issue to be decided in the final singles match between Cochet and George Lott, 24-year-old star from the University of Chicago, playing in his first Davis cup challenge round.

In a crisis like this, Cochet was unbeatable. He stormed his way through Lott's defense for a 6-1, 3-6, 6-0, 6-3 triumph.

Skits and Scratches

George Scales, right fielder, and one of Spec Keene's prize basketball players, drew the leather medal Sunday. George fanned twice and really got three hits. The first time he hit, however, he stepped over the first base bag. Hafendfeldt evidently was the only one of the players to miss the basket. He grabbed the pellet and threw it to Sullivan for a put out. Scales got a single in the seventh, but was picked off by Edwards' sharpshooting. He finally got safely all the way around when everybody was doing it in the ninth.

Buono tramped on Lamb's left foot in the second. Time had to be called while the injured member was taken care of. Buono had reached first via the walk route, and was bustling over to the second sack on L. Girod's hit, when Gibson threw to Lamb who was standing on the sack. Buono came in standing up and put his spikes into Lamb's shoe.

Lamb was given credit for one of the freakiest two base hits of the year. He hit a bouncer in the second. It bounced so high that it went clear over Cox's head. Cox is the tallest man on the Mt. Scott team but he couldn't reach it. Nobody was covering first at the time and Lamb would probably have been safe even if the ball had been stopped.

Caulkins had better put a different colored shirt on next time he bats against Meyers. Those red sleeves apparently had the effect of a red rag to a bull, upon Meyers. In the fifth the hurler sunk one into Saulkins' left shoulder that sent the third baseman down. In the seventh he had the big boy dodging and when, in the ninth Meyers again skinned one over Caulkins' back, the batter showed indications of going out to the mound. However, Meyers assured him there was nothing personal in the matter.

This boy Harris seems to have the Senators' number. He has made three appearances against the locals and has stood them on their heads each time. Harris does have his bad days, too, and if he keeps coming the Solons are bound to trim him. Here's hoping his next Sunday, when the Mountaineers make their second appearance as many weeks.

Give the Mt. Scott Tigers dependable hurlers and they will make the rest of the clubs work. They have a hustling bunch of youngsters who like to play. They seem to get more fun out of winning than standing about figuring on their share of the "cut."

The New York Yankees, whose runaway victories in the American league were the despair of all rivals, are getting a taste of their own medicine these days and it's a bit doubtful if they like it.

In the last three American league pennant drives, contenders used to play .700 baseball; only to find that not only could they not gain an inch but actually lost ground to the Yankee steamroller that over long stretches could play at better than an .800 clip.

The same thing is holding true again this season except that the Yanks have yielded their accustomed "Simon Legree" role to Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics. The Yankees of 1929 pull up half a game one day only to watch the Athletics increase their lead by winning a double bill or by winning while the Yanks lose. It's all most disheartening to Miller Huggins just as it was to managers of would-be contenders when the Yankee machine was running wild.

Through the enforced idleness of the Athletics, the Yanks found an opportunity to whittle away a little of the Athletics' lead and just barely took advantage of it. It took a home run by the one and only George Herman Ruth to enable the Yankees to down the St. Louis Browns, 7-6, in 12 innings and cut the Athletics' lead to 10 games. With the score tied at 6-6 in the 12th, Ruth, the first man at bat, drove the ball into the bleachers for his 24th homer of the season. Lou Gehrig had hit his 25th homer in the first inning with one on.
