

BUS ROUTES TO ADD 36 PUPILS ALBANY SCHOOL

Albany—Mrs. Edna Geer, Linn county school superintendent, met with O. E. Finney, superintendent of Albany schools, and D. D. Hackleman, clerk of the city school board, Monday to assist them in mapping out tentative bus routes for a report which is in preparation on the district's plan of putting into effect the school transportation law enacted by the 1928 state legislature.

Nearby school districts which have signified their desire to accept the advantages of the new law are Scrabbleville, Oakville, Orleans, Bell Plain, McFarland, and Lakeview. Others have stated that they do not wish to accept the plan.

It has been estimated that transportation would bring 36 additional students of high school age to Albany. A check on last year's enrollment shows that of the 590 enrolled, 200 of them came from districts outside of Albany. Some districts having but few pupils in the upper three years of the grammar grades are contemplating sending them to the county seat, but figures are not available.
