

ALBANY BOARD TO GET SCHOOL ROUTE LISTINGS

Albany—The Albany school board will receive for its approval, routes mapped out by G. E. Finnerty, Albany school superintendent, and Mrs. Edna Geer, county school superintendent, which are planned to care for Dever, Scravell, and Knox Butte communities, and accommodate about 20 high school children who will be brought to Albany to school. An attempt will be made to work out a route that will accommodate both the Crabtree and Lakeview districts.

A feature of the route system will be the agreement between Linn and Benton counties to permit the children living within the county to attend the nearest school. According to this arrangement, Albany will take care of children living in northern Benton county, while Corvallis will establish a route for those living along the Willamette river in the Peoria and western Oakville districts.
