

CLUB MEMBERS ARE BUSY WITH STOCK JUDGING

Dallas—Forty livestock club members and local leaders last week judged hogs at three of the leading herds in the valley. These are part of the 70 or more boys and girls who are enrolled in livestock club work in the county this year and they are learning the "ins" and "outs" of selecting the best kinds of farm animals.

The work was in charge of the county agent, J. R. Beck, who had H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist of the O. E. C. extension service, along to place the various classes and instruct the young folks in the type of the various breeds. This is part of the training that these boys and girls receive each year.

On Monday, August 12, the entire day will be devoted to judging of dairy cattle; and later in the summer one day will be taken up with sheep. Following this series of three days, the two clubs that have made the best showing will have the opportunity of sending a judging team to the state fair and Pacific International.

The work on hogs was carried on the farms of Robert Pence at Rickreall, R. W. Hogg & Sons of Eola and Cass Nichols of Salem. Durocs, Poland Chinas and Chester Whites were the three breeds that the young folks worked on.
