Chase and Chase

In reply to the query of some erudite Salemite who had never heard of Alexander Hamilton, whose portrait adorns the \$10 bills of our new abbreviated currency, the Portland Oregonian adds the information that the portrait of Chase on the \$10,000 bills is that of Samuel Chase and explains:

Samuel Chase was a member of the colonial legislature, was one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, and was noted for the lead he took in denouncing and resisting the stamp act.

Having never seen and not likely to ever see a \$10,000 bill, the learned Oregonian, presumably familiar with such trifles may be right, though the advance notices and facsimiles printed as we recall showed that it was Salmon P. Chase whose memory is thus perpetuated.

Surely there is no reason why Samuel Chase should be selected to grace our currency. It is true he was a signer of the Declaration of Independence but so were 55 others. Appointed as associate justice to the United States supreme court in 1796 by President Washington he won unenviable fame by his introduction of partisan politics on the bench. His practice of commending Federalist policies and arraigning those of the Republicans, in his charges to grand juries was so bitterly resented that he was impeached through the efforts of John Randolph of Roanoke in 1804. The resultant trial was one of the most famous impeachment trials in American history, but the prosecution failed to secure the necessary two-thirds vote and he was declared not guilty.

Salmon P. Chase, on the other hand, filled a much larger place in history, as political leader, financier and jurist. He was one of the leaders of the anti-slavery movement, the leading spirit in the Free Soil party, and anti-slavery member of the United States senate, one of the organizers of the Republican party, and as a Republican elected governor of Ohio in 1856. He was an aspirant for the Republican nomination for the presidency in 1860 and resigned from the senate to which he had been reelected to become Secretary of the Treasury in Lincoln's cabinet and was one of the latter's most trusted advisors. He resigned in 1864 to be appointed chief justice of the United States supreme court, a position to be held until his death.

There is of course reason why Salmon P. Chase's brilliant services to the nation should be commemorated—no reason why Samuel Chase's well earned rest in obscurity be disturbed.

A Grand Old Man

John R. Voorhis, state superintendent of elections in New York, and Grand Sachem of Tammany Hall recently celebrated his 100th birthday. He richly deserves the tribute paid him, for he is interesting for something more than having mastered the technique of survival, having led a busy and useful life. His attitude toward public affairs has been exemplary and high minded and he has served with honor and distinction in many posts. His name has become a synonym of honest service.

The centenarian was born in an old Dutch farm house at Pompton Plains, N. J., and educated in private schools. At 14 he went to work in the law office of John Jay and three years later entered his uncle's employ as a stair builder and it was as a builder that he accumulated the comparatively modest fortune he now enjoys. He has held office under thirteen mayors.

Mr. Voorhis can be found daily at his office absorbing details and making decisions with a vigor that many a young man envies. No harder worker is known. He took his first vacation in 1891 and did not have another holiday until 34 years later when influenza laid him up for two weeks. Last year he was absent from his office but one day—despite his 99 years.

Alva Johnson, in the New Yorker has given some side lights on Mr. Voorhis' longevity. He says:

Mr. Voorhis does not know the secret of his success. He has never played any of the systems. He missed his annual medical examination more than ninety consecutive times. No daily doze. No spinach. No long walks in the open air. No exercise that could be avoided. To his practical and economical way of thinking, the deliberate wasting of motion is as reprehensible as any other kind of squandering, and physical culture is a peculiarly inept occupation. He eats sparingly once or twice a day, never worries and never lets work accumulate. . . . He regards New Yorkers of today a poor set compared to those of Andrew Jackson's time. He thinks the old trustworthiness is disappearing from men, building construction and liquor.

Keeley and Volstead Cures

The annual statement of the original Keeley Institute for the cure of alcoholism at Dwight, Ill., founded by the late Dr. Leslie Keeley shows that Volsteadism has brought such great prosperity and so many patients that the institution has been forced to increase its dormitories and its study halls. The secretary's statement calls 1928 the greatest but one in its history. There were 753 undergraduates, a number only exceeded in 1907 a year of speculation and panic. Under prohibition, progress has been steady and gratifying.

Prohibition has also brought a change in the social status of the inmates. Before Volstead, there were more workmen than business and professional men but the latter have been in the majority the past few years. Moreover the fast growing pressure of women applicants has forced the building of a separate hall for women. In the early days only men were admitted. This is one of the many unexpected results of the dry law.

Thus we find the Volstead cure a strong stimulus to the Keeley cure and the more we have of Volstead, the greater the need for Keeley.
