For the second time in as many weeks, Mt. Scott, behind the pitching of Harris, defeated the Salem Senators 9 to 5, Sunday afternoon in an Oregon-Washington league game. Salem outbatted the Tigers 12 to 11, but the visitors, bunching their hits in the fourth and sixth, together with the wildness of Meyer, relief hurler, made the most of their opportunity and put the game away.

Barham, who started the game, began like a world beater, holding the mountaineers to one run in the first three innings. In the fourth, however, he let the bases load, and an error by Hafensfeldt, enabled the visitors to score three runs. They added another in the fifth.

In the sixth Barham left the mound after filling the bases with none out. Meyer was sent to the rescue about half warmed up. Seales got a hit and then Grod walked, forcing in a run. Cox and Calkins were both hit by pitched balls and by the time Pettijohn flew out to Bigbee for the third out, the Tigers had batted around and had chalked up four tallies. Meyer settled down after that and blanked the visitors during the last three innings.

Salem scored once in the first on a hit by Quinn, a sacrifice by Lamb and a two base smash by Bigbee. Three more were added in the fifth. Edwards got a single and went to second and Barham was safe at first when Cox juggled the ball. Both runners advanced on Quinn's sacrifice. Lamb went out, short to first. Bigbee then singled to center forcing Edwards and Barham. Sullivan got a two bagger, putting Bigbee on third. Bigbee scored when Harris uncorked a wild heave. Hafensfeldt went out short to first.

Meyer scored Salem's tally in the seventh. He singled and was safe at second when Grod failed to touch second base while attempting to put him out. Quinn was safe at first on the play. Lamb came to bat and hit into a double play, Meyer going to third. The Salem hurler came home on Bigbee's single.

Salem had men on base in each of the last three innings, but on each occasion snappy double play by the Mt. Scotters nipped a possible rally.

Although each side was credited with three misplays, the Senators played in hard luck throughout. Hits that ordinarily would have been easy outs, either took bad bounds or were just out of reach of a defense player.

The loss of the Senators and the win of Longview over Montavilla places Salem and the Rangers in a tie for first place. This means that the solons have their work cut out for them when Montavilla comes here next Sunday.

Leaders Add A Little To Advantages In Games Over Week End; Cubs Win

The week-end fighting along the major league front was all in favor of the two leading teams; not very much, it is true, but still in their favor.

With the Pirates rained out on Saturday and idle Sunday, the Cubs occupied their time by turning back the Brook-

lyn Robins in two games, and so stretching the Chicago lead to six and one-half games. The Mackmen played a bruising 8 to 8 tie with the Browns on Saturday and took their ease Monday, while the Yankees were dividing a pair with the industrious Indians. This left the margin of the Mackmen at 11 and one-half games, just where it was 48 hours ago, but with the important difference that one game of the lead was transferred from the relatively non-essential won column to the vital line of figures detailing games lost. The Yankees now have lost 10 games more than the Flying Macs, who are moving at a gallop which might possibly level that 23 year old record of 116 games won by the Cubs of Frank Chance.

The mad dash of the Cubs continued Sunday when Uncle Wilbert Robinson dared to expose a left-hander, William Watson Clark, to the fire of the Bruins. Clark did very well against the heavy guns of the Chicago array, but succumbed by 6 to 4 when Charlie Grimm, the only left handed swinger on the McCarthy club, connected for a single with men on second and third in the seventh.

Heavyweight Situation Clarified; Sharkey To Box Schmeling In Sept.

New York (UP)—Since fight fans of the United States are anxious to have the heavyweight situation clarified, the following facts are set forth:

Jack Sharkey of Boston and Max Schmeling of Germany will meet in September under the auspices of Madison Square Garden in a bout to decide who shall be named as Gene Tunney's successor.

The fight will take place either in New York city or Detroit. The New York state athletic commission will be asked Monday to approve Tom Heeney, Tunney's last opponent as a suitable opponent for Schmeling at Ebbetts Field, Brooklyn, September 4. If the commission agrees, and Schmeling defeats the New Zealander, the German will box Sharkey at Yankee stadium on September 28.

William Muldoon, dean of the New York commission is on record as ready to insist upon Tommy Loughran, present light heavyweight champion, as Schmeling's next opponent provided the present arrangement to avoid Phil Scott, British heavyweight, are carried through. In case Muldoon persuades the commission to substitute Loughran for Scott, whom Schmeling refuses to meet, the German's handlers will decline the match.

If the New York commissioners insist that Max must box Scott or Loughran for Humbert J. Fugazy before meeting Sharkey there is no chance of the bout to decide the heavyweight title being held in New York City. Schmeling's handlers know that Loughran would "make Max look bad."

They have the same feeling about Phil Scott.
