The call was not immediately answered as those who could have aided him thought Varitz was pretending, but when he sank under the surface the third time Raymond Koster dove for him and with the aid of several other bathers brought him to shore. He had swallowed no water, holding his breath while under in fright, which caused his nose to bleed slightly. He was taken home immediately.

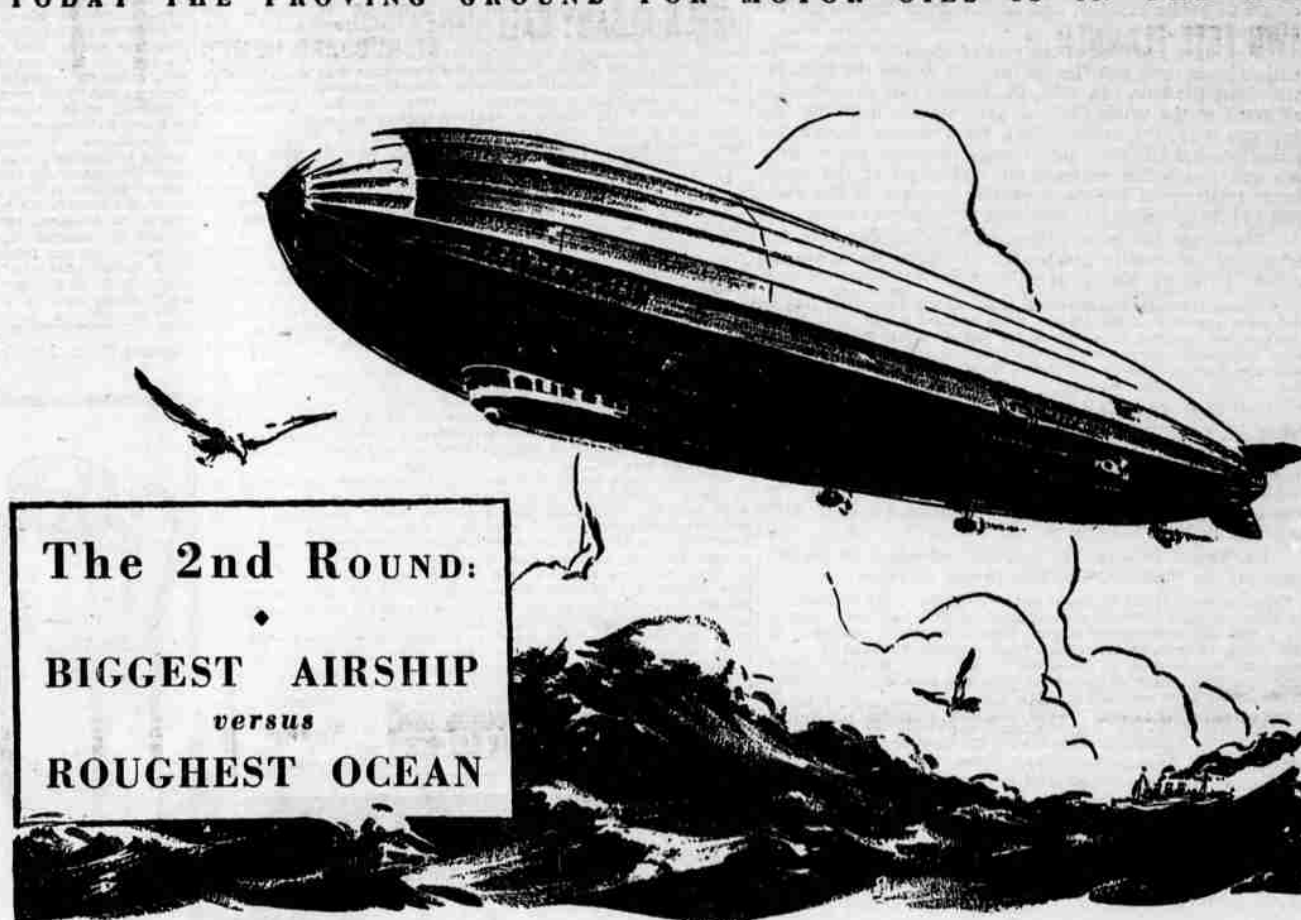
