LINN BOUNDARY BOARD TO ACT, CONVEYANCE

Albany—The high school transportation problem will be left to the Linn county boundary board for settlement, according to a decision made by the city school board Tuesday night. The local board will not try to attract students from outside its own sphere, although it will endeavor to care for those in the area allotted to it by the boundary board.

Superintendent G. E. Finnerly reported that a few districts have expressed themselves desirous of taking advantage of the law passed by the recent state legislature in respect to transporting students. Some districts have made no statement, while still others do not wish to avail themselves of the service. Finnerly stated that it is being found that transportation costs for the property owners of the non-high school districts, who must pay the bills, can make the transportation a very expensive luxury.

Indications at present are that the boundary board will not authorize the carrying of students beyond their legitimate zones unless the additional distance is compensated for by efficiency of the educational service. Definite action is expected when the boundary board meets on August 15.
