

WORD COMES FROM SHIP LONG BOUND IN ICE

St. Paul, Alaska (AP)—The crew of the schooner Elsie, damaged by ice floes Saturday but not a total loss, as first reported, after being ice bound off North Cape in Bering sea for more than a year was reported by radio here Monday night to be proceeding or was to proceed to East Cape, Siberia by their small boats or by the Russian steamer Slavof which had been reported standing by the beached Elsie.

R. S. Pollister, agent of the Olaf Swenson company, Seattle, aboard the Elsie when damaged, has requested the United States coast guard vessel Northland to pick up the crew at East Cape about September 10.

The Elsie wintered in the ice north of Cape Siberia and was reported clear on July 29 when cargo was unloaded at North Cape. She then proceeded toward Kilyma where heavy ice was encountered and the hull was damaged on the night of August 10. She then beached near Cape Billings. Twenty Seattle men were on the ship when she was damaged.

BLAST KILLS ROAD WORKER

Baker, Ore. (AP)—L. R. Young, 47, was killed by a dynamite blast while working in the rock pit at the Joslin-McAllister road camp near here Sunday. The upper part of the man's body was blown 125 yards from the pit and other parts of the torso were scattered far away.

Bryan Raymond, working with Young, was within 20 feet of him when the blast occurred. He was knocked unconscious but was not injured.

The exact cause of the accident had not been determined Monday, but company officials expressed the theory that the "pocket" had not been given sufficient time to cool before additional dynamite was placed in the hole.

MAYOR IS INJURED ON STATE HIGHWAY

B. E. Smith, who was in the same car with him, wiped the blood from the wounds and stopped the bleeding as best he could until they reached Newport, where he received medical attention. Mrs. Thomas was in the party also. She will remain in Newport with Mrs. Swope and Mrs. Carberry and Mrs. Horton for a few days.

MAN FALLS 14000 FEET THEN PULLS RIP CORD

Chicago (AP)—Jack Cope, veteran air stunt man, stepped off a plane 15,000 feet above Municipal airport and fell 14,000 feet before pulling the rip cord of his parachute Sunday night. He established a new record for a delayed drop, field officials said.

Colorado Springs, Colo. (AP)—A world record parachute jump from an altitude of 19,500 feet was claimed here Monday by Jimmy Donohue, who landed three miles from the point where he was cut loose from an airplane. The drop took 19 minutes.

PARACHUTE SAVES STUDENT AIR PILOT

San Antonio, Texas (AP)—Hurled into space 3,000 feet above ground while traveling in an airplane more than 100 miles an hour, Cadet H. N. Goetz, St. Paul, Minn., descended uninjured.

Goetz, a 21 year old student pilot at Kelly Field, landed safely with his parachute, while his plane crashed two miles away. He was performing a barrel roll in a fast pursuit plane when his safety belt broke, hurling him clear of the ship.

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TEX RANKIN TO RETURN NORTH BY EASY HOPS

San Diego, Cal. (AP)—Tex Rankin, who Monday flew down the entire Pacific coast section of the United States in a non-stop flight in a little four-cylinder plane which he had named "Three Flaps" because of the fact that he was to start in British Columbia, fly over the United States and land on Mexican territory, planned early Tuesday to begin his trip back north at about 10 a. m. He would stop at Los Angeles and then go on to his home in Portland in easy stages.

The jovial aviator, grinning with pride over his achievement, acknowledged that he had "traveled light." His "baggage," over which he showed some concern when he landed at Agua Caliente, Mexico, Monday, consisted of a clean shirt, a pair of trousers, a toothbrush and a razor. It was all wrapped up in a piece of paper, to save room and avoid extra weight in the little plane.

As far as could be learned here Rankin is the first flier to take off in Canada and land in Mexico in a non-stop flight, although two army aviators, Captain Lowell Smith and Lieut. John Paul Richter, flew from border to border in 1923. They started and landed in American territory, however, and flew a plane with a 400 h. p. engine. Their plane was refueled twice in the flight.

Rankin's engine is a four-cylinder air cooled one, developing between 80 and 90 horsepower. Flying the air mail route down from the north, he estimated he covered at least 1,350 miles. This would mean he averaged around 18 miles to the gallon of gasoline, despite his 100-mile-an-hour pace.

JOHN M. HEATH ENTERS PLEA

Detroit (AP)—John M. Heath was arraigned before United States Commissioner J. Stanley Hurd Monday on three charges growing out of the death of Richard J. Sandilands, federal prohibition agent. Heath stood mute and a plea of not guilty was entered for him. He was ordered held in the county jail in default of \$50,000 bond.

The charges against Heath were the same as those made last week against his wife, Maxine. He was charged with assaulting, resisting and interfering with a federal officer in the performance of his duty, resisting the officer's attempt to seize his boat, and using a dangerous weapon in resisting him.

Heath's examination was set for August 26. Mrs. Heath's examination, originally set for August 16, was changed to that date also.

UNDERGROUND WORK STARTED AT ALBANY

Albany—Following the new policy of the Albany city council work of putting its main telephone wires leads on a number of streets in Albany in underground conduits was started Monday in Albany by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

In the spring this work will be extended to other parts of the city and business district, it was stated.

AMERICAN DELEGATES CONSUME MUCH WINE

Berlin (AP)—German newspapers feature the news of Monday night's banquet to the delegates of the International Advertising association here as "gastronomic record," with "4,000 bottles of wine" consumed, 50 per cent of it by guests from the United States.

The 2,500 guests were served by more than 400 waiters.

To furnish the meal, one of the items on the menu, 250 calves were killed. For relishes 35,000 crabs and other delicacies were supplied.

Santiago, Chile (AP)—Twenty-two Pullman passengers, 10 railway employees and an unknown number of second class passengers were snow-bound Monday after 70 hours of isolation on a train about 50 miles from Los Andes. Among the passengers were eight women and six children.

The snowstorm was said by road officials to have been the worst in years, making operations along the road way impossible.

His faithful Husky dog was found alive by searching parties that set out on the trapper's trail after the blizzard had spent its force.

It is now in the royal Canadian mounted police headquarters at Herschel Island, Christie's body was buried at Bathurst inlet. He has a brother, D. M. Christie, of Quincy, Mass.

GARDNER DROPS DEAD WHEN STUNG BY BEE

Philadelphia, Pa. (AP)—James Raute, 59, gardener at the Andorra nurseries in Chestnut Hill, was stung by a bee Monday and died instantly. Medical authorities were unable to explain whether Raute had died of shock, heart disease or some unknown virus from the bee's sting. An autopsy was ordered.

BOY CONFESSES TWO SLAYINGS

Chicago (AP)—Two recent slayings, one of which had been attributed to "Baby Face" Willie Doody, were solved Monday, police said, by confessions of two youths captured Saturday.

Robert Camy, 18, a graduate of the New Harmony, Ind., high school and Earl Nicholson, 20, of Chicago, were identified during Sunday's police show-up by 25 robbery victims. They told of committing many murders including the holdup of George Schreiner's pharmacy in which Schreiner was killed, and the robbery and slaying of Leon Raymond. Schreiner was killed, the confessions said, because the youths "thought he was after a gun." Raymond, previously believed to have been a victim of "Baby Face" Doody, was killed "because he looked dangerous."

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
