Harpist Wins Honor In Paris

Miss Adeline Stopp former Salem girl who for the past three years has been continuing her musical study in Paris, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stopp, is visiting in Salem for several weeks. The Stopp's are now making their home in Portland.

While studying at Fountainebleau, near Paris, in 1926 Miss Stopp was advised to compete for the foreign seat in the harp division, then vacant, at the Paris National Conservatory. After examinations held before a board of examiners consisting of eight prominent musicians, Miss Stopp was chosen to compete in the finals in competition with a Greek girl who was first prize harpist at Athens. Miss Stopp emerged from this contest the successful candidate. Miss Stopp has made remarkable progress the past three years and has been successful in passing each year the examinations held entitling her to retain her seat in the Paris conservatory.

Miss Stopp is the first American harpist ever to receive official recognition from the examiners of this institution. The last year's summer vacation last year were spent by Miss Stopp in study at the Royal Academy of Music at London, England. Salem friends will be interested to learn that the young musician is planning to give a concert here in early October, prior to her departure in the fall for Europe.
