Interment was in Belle Pass cemetery.

Mary Engelbreit was born in Norway on June 3, 1858 and came to the United States in 1881, settling in Decora, Iowa, where she was united in marriage to John Gulickson in 1883. To this marriage four sons were born, three of whom preceded her in death. Mr. and Mrs. Gulickson moved to Wisconsin where they lived for 25 years. On coming to Oregon they resided at Canby for five years and for the past ten years have made their home in Woodburn.

The husband and one son, Henry, survive.

BAR VIEW BEACH TRAGEDY SCENE; BODY RECOVERED

Bar View—Henry Bryan of Milwaukie, age 30, was drowned at Bar View Tuesday afternoon about 5 o'clock, while fishing near Arch rock, near the life saving station.

The body was recovered within a few minutes by the life saving crew, under the direction of Captain Parley and was shipped to Tillamook to Coroner Hinkle.

Mr. Bryan was a married man but had no children. His wife accompanied him here for a vacation, as his health was not very good. He was fishing with two other companions, one a brother-in-law, at the time of the drowning, and it was supposed that he slipped from a large rock. There were no unusual waves to wash him off.

They came here on Friday and intended to leave Monday evening but owing to their good luck fishing they stayed another day. They were camping in one of Dr. Wise's cottages.

The wife and friends returned to Milwaukie immediately following the recovery of the body.

This is the second drowning here within the last month.
