Fourth Annual Reunion Of Jones Family Held At State Fairgrounds

Brooks—In commemoration of the arrival of S. W. R. Jones and family in the Willamette valley his children and descendants met Sunday at the state fair grounds.

From various causes, unavoidable, many were unable to attend this year but the interest and enthusiasm was not lacking, and those who did, not respond to the roll call sent greetings and best wishes which they intend bringing in person the coming year.

The day marked the fourth year for the gathering and the 76th anniversary, the little party arriving in the Waldo Hills, August 27, 1853.

The dinner was delayed to allow those coming from a distance to donate and partake and the regular memorial meeting was not called until 2:30 o'clock. This was opened by all singing "America," followed by the Lord's prayer. The minutes of the last year's meeting were read by the secretary, Lillian Hubbs of Silverton, with President "Aunt Sarah" Clark in the chair. Business with the election of officers for the new year was next disposed of. Mrs. C. E. Clark of Woodburn was chosen president with Mrs. Sarah Clark remaining as honor-ary president. Mrs. Ronald E. Jones was made secretary and Mrs. Sylvia Bixley re-elected treasurer. Ella H. Jones of Eugene was elected vice-president.

Hon. M. L. Jones, the oldest living member of the S. W. R. Jones family and the only one to remember crossing the plains with his father, made a short speech, relating the incidents and impressions of that early day. He dwelt briefly on the number of trades and professions entered by the descendants which now number better than 200, most of whom live on the west coast. Smilingly he admitted that preservers were a little scarce in the ranks but of "practitioners" there were many.

Mrs. Scott Jones' reading of the years news items pertaining to the doings of the family was extremely interesting a few of which are reprinted.

"About 300 friends and relatives called at Labish Meadows farms to felicitate M. L. Jones on his 80th birthday. The fine old house has since been destroyed by fire but nothing can destroy the pleasant memories cherished of the delightful hospitality of that home."

"Mr. and Mrs. Jay Cooke Allen and small son, of Paris, France, visited the homeland during the winter. He is associated with the Chicago Tribune and his duties often take him to all parts of Europe."

"Pat, five year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis H. Jones took a first prize at the Sunset Trail pageant at Eugene."

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BUS PETITIONS FOR ROUTES TO AFFORD ACTION

Albany, Ore.—The Linn county school district board will not recognize petitions for bus routes under the new high school transportation law unless the petitions are duly presented by the school boards of the districts desiring to take advantage of its provisions. It was announced, following a meeting of the board here.

Three petitions have been received by the Albany school board, but not from boards in other schools. The application of Superintendent Tobie of the Stayton schools is thus far unaccompanied by any statement from the Stayton school board that it is behind the project; although it may develop it.

As a result of this policy, the expected arrangement for high school children living in Linn county south of Corvallis and along the Willamette river will probably not attend the Corvallis high school as Corvallis has not filed such a petition for the bus route with the Linn county board.

The Albany school board is petitioning for three bus routes and although the applications have not been filed, they will be soon, it is understood on good authority.
