

BREAK IN LINE AT CAMP FATAL TO RIGGER MAN

Silverton—Thomas Cummings, 28, a rigger, was almost instantly killed while working at camp No. 14 in the Silver Falls district about 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. He was alone at the time.

A break in the high line was the cause of the accident, the line striking Cummings across the chest and neck. He was alive when picked up and placed on a stretcher but death occurred before Silverton was reached. The body was brought here by "Red" Johnson and John Dick.

Cummings was an orphan since four years of age and was raised by Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ruben. His father was a horse shoer here. His one surviving relative is a sister, Ruth, a special nurse at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Silverton—Decision to sponsor a community fair, sponsored by both the community club and the American Legion, was reached at a mass meeting Wednesday evening after much discussion.

The proposed wading pool was discussed and a favorable action taken. It was decided that the community should get back of the proposal and that it be constructed through public subscription. Some money was pledged at the meeting.
