

JAIL AND FINE SENTENCES ARE GIVEN IN LINN

Albany—Four indictments were returned Wednesday by the Linn county grand jury in session previous to the September term of the Linn county circuit court, which convenes, September 3.

True bills were found against C. R. Lantz, for obtaining money under false pretenses; Charles Allen, for stealing an automobile; Paul Judd, forger; Kyle Beebe, accused of stealing chickens.

Three of the defendants were arraigned Thursday, pleading guilty and were fined. Lantz was sentenced to the penitentiary and paroled to his attorney; Judd was sentenced for passing a forged check, was under parole from the Washington state penitentiary at Walla Walla and probably will be returned to that institution. Beebe drew 30 days in the Linn county jail for stealing chickens.

In addition to the indicted defendants, three others appeared before presiding Judge Percy R. Kelly to the several charges preferred against them. They were D. D. Blitt, Mill City; accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor; George L. Carroll, Freewater, charged with larceny by bailment; Harold Billings, Waterloo, accused of taking an automobile without authority without intent to steal.

Sitz was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100. Judd was sentenced to the Oregon penitentiary without limitation of time for a maximum term of two years and was paroled to Sheriff Herbert Shelton. Billings drew a six months jail sentence and was paroled to his father, E. H. Billings.
