With the assistance of near neighbors she managed to get the car into the road and return to Scio, where her wounds were dressed. No bones were broken and the car was not badly damaged.

Mrs. Flanagan's husband has been a rural mail carrier in this section for nearly 20 years, and she frequently substitutes for him and others on Scio routes.

SCHOOL BOARD TAKES ACTION ON BUS ROUTE

Albany—Word has been received here by Mrs. Edna Gear, county school superintendent, stating the Corvallis school board will not furnish transportation to high school students from non-standard high school districts. This will eliminate the plan for a bus line in the Peoria-Oakville. Lake Creek section of the county to carry students to the Corvallis high school.

Some weeks ago a petition which purported to have the sanction of Mrs. Gear, asking for a bus line down the Peoria-Corvallis road into the Oakville community. In Linn county the boundary board has adopted the rule that it will not authorize bus routes unless application for them is made by school boards.

The communication was received from H. L. Mack, secretary of the Benton county board. The gist of the letter was that the school board had always been desirous of extending privileges to all high school students from non-standard school districts, but that such districts will have to transport their children or make arrangements for their transportation unless the boundary board is willing to guarantee payment of all necessary expenses.
