STATES SOVIET EXTERMINATING RUSSIAN JEWS

Paris (AP)—After four weeks spent in Soviet Russia investigating the conditions of Jews living under the bolshevik regime, Rabbi Simon Glaz- er, president of the central coun- cil of rabbis of greater New York, has returned to western Europe convinced that "slowly but surely the life is being snuffed out of more than 3,000,000 Russian Jews by the iron rule of diabolical in- genuity of bolshevism."

Rabbi Glazer passed most of his time while in Russia in the villages where he got in touch with Russian rabbis and Jewish faithful.

From the results of his investi- gation he told the Associated Press correspondent that not more than 10 per cent of the number of Jews once in Russia were now attached to Judaism there. Among those who have survived the troubles of the last 10 years, "death and insanity are considered messengers of mer- cy," Rabbi Glazer said.

He had interviewed several of 31 rabbis who signed a proclamation to the Jewish world last December saying that religion was guaranteed freedom in Russia and that they had no need of outside help.

"They told me they were all forced to sign at the point of a pis- tol, or under the threat of having their families scattered," Rabbi Glazer said that several rich Amer-

SHIP BREAKING ON NORTH COAST

Kodiak, Alaska (AP)—Lashed by terrific gales and pounded by heavy seas, the Oceanic and Oriental company's freighter Golden Forest, was breaking up Thursday on the north shore of Shelikof Straits, near Katmai volcano where she ground- ed September 8.

In answer to a call for assistance, the United States coast guard cutter Haida, en route to Cordova with a member of her crew seriously ill, changed her course toward the wreck.

The wrecked freighter carried a crew of 37. Salvage ships standing by are believed to have transferred some of the crew, but how many is not known. The vessel is rated as a total loss.

The Golden Forest was enroute to Dairen from San Francisco when disaster overtook her. She went aground on Avatanak island on Ju- ly 24. Freed from her position by salvaging ships she was being tow- ed to Seattle when a storm struck her and the rescue ship.

The vessel is commanded by Cap- tain L. C. Drewson. T. G. Plant, ex- ecutive of the American-Hawaiian Steamship company, represents the ship's owners in San Francisco.

HEAD OF CHIEFS FOR LESS FIRE

Citing statistics to show that in 1928 fire destroyed physical prop- erties in Oregon to the value of \$6,700,000 and that since 1923 Ore- gon's fire waste has amounted to \$52,000,000, "more than enough to pay the state's indebtedness," and place the state on a cash basis," President Pearson of the Oregon State Fire Chief's association, in a circular letter issued Thursday, is appealing to the fire chiefs to join with the association in a statewide fire prevention campaign during Fire Prevention Week—October 6 to 12.

President Pearson states that, while the association is sponsor- ing and taking a leading role in the campaign, State Fire Marshal Clara A. Lee is cooperating and has placed the entire resources of his department at the service of the organization.

Pearson is chief of the McMinn- ville department.

BENITO QUILTS SIX OFFICES

Rome (AP)—Premier Benito Mus- solini started the political world Thursday by giving up six of his cabinet posts and distributing them among his under secretaries.

The portfolios given up by the Italian dictator were for foreign af- fairs, war, marine, air, colonies and labor. He retained two cabinet posts besides his premiership—those of public works and interior.

Thus Dino Grihi became minister for foreign affairs; M. De Bono for colonies; General Pietro Gazzera became minister for war; Giuseppe Strani became minister of marine; Italo Balbo was named minister of aviation and former Under-Secretary Bottai became the new sec- retary of labor and corporations.

Deputy Balbino Giuliano was ap- pointed minister of education to replace Giuseppe Beluzzo, and henceforth the post will be called the national education department.
