BUS PURCHASE ACTION IS DUE FRIDAY NIGHT

Scio—Anticipating high school transportation demands created by recent state legislation, the board of directors of the Scio district at a called meeting Friday evening decided to purchase two buses for use on routes recently established by the Linn county school district boundary board.

The board had called for bids on contracts to transport students on three routes to the Scio high school. However, upon further consideration the board decided it would be economy for the district to purchase and operate at least two buses, leaving the third route to contract transportation. Several bids were received on the three routes and a bid for the one contract was tentatively decided upon, according to information given out after the meeting. Definite announcement could not be made for the reason that the matter was still pending, it was stated. Paul Rorer is figuring on this contract, which covers the Larwood route.

Buses with Ford chassis and Wayne bodies are to be used, it is stated. Each bus will accommodate 20 to 25 students, and each bus owned by the Scio school district is to be operated by a local teacher, according to announced plans. E. P. Caldwell will drive one and the new high school teacher yet to be employed will be assigned to the other bus. The third bus will be operated under the direction of the successful bidder for the contract, it is planned.

The cost of the two buses is approximately \$3500, it is announced, and payments are to be spread over a number of years. A third bus will be purchased next year if deemed advisable by the school board, and these will accommodate the needs of the Scio schools for a number of years, it is believed.
