Fair Oaks: Mrs. Ross Danrell, chairman; A. Kreuger, judge; Mrs. J. Brophy, Ray Lacey and Mrs. Ray Lacey, clerks. Two ordinances pertaining to bond issues were passed by the council which it was also decided to gravel Cascade Drive if sufficient funds are available for this purpose. Repair of one of the water tanks on the hill was also authorized while the council sanctioned the repurchase of one of the city water bonds held by Charles Ruge. With the exception of Mayor Greene, who was absent from the city and Mrs. J. I. Miller, city recorder who is ill, all members of the council were present.

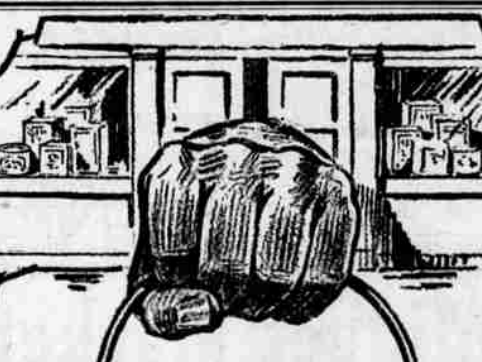
KINGWOOD

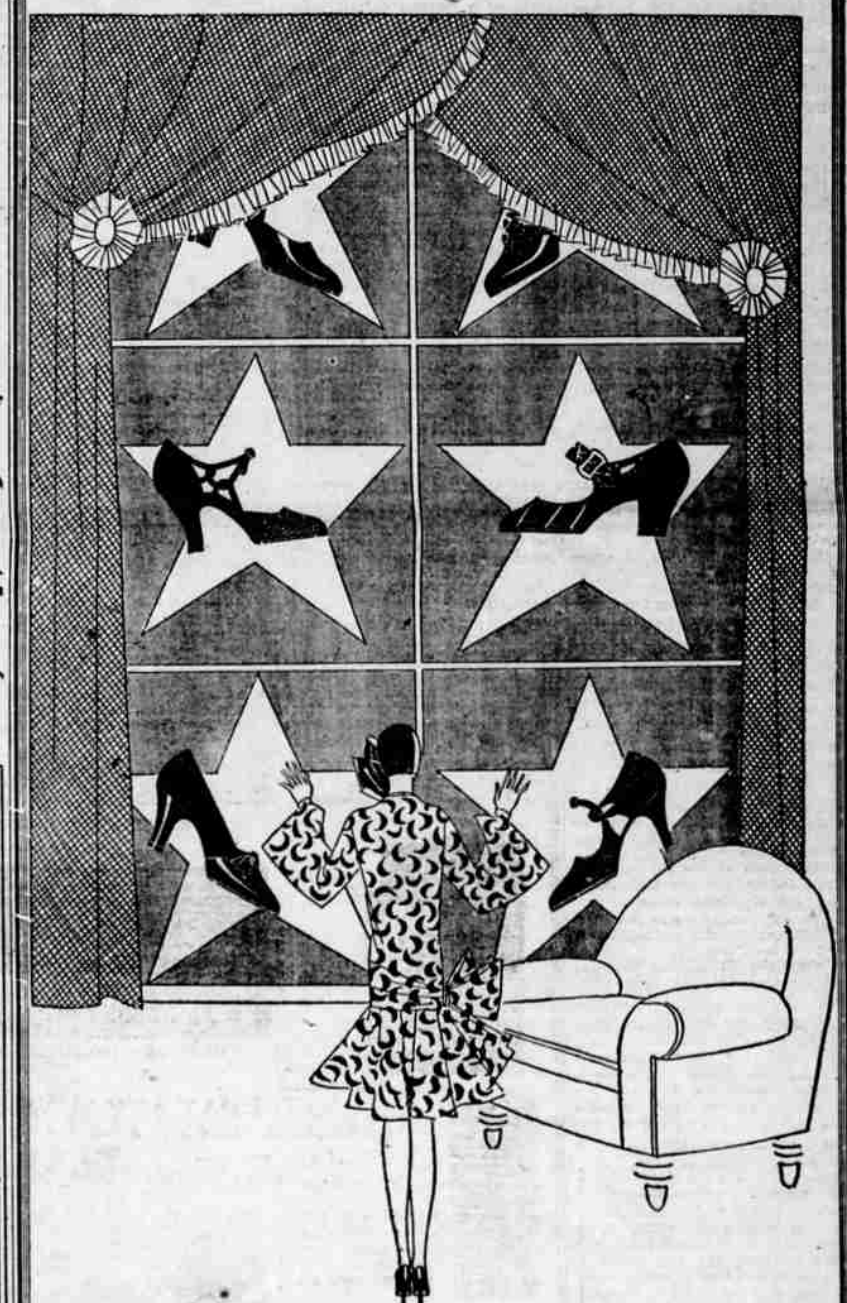
THREE GIRLS BORN AT DALLAS HOSPITAL
