ROAD IMPROVEMENT HINGED ON GRAVEL

If it is possible to secure the gravel for the improvement, of what is known as the Checkerboard road from the city limits of Gervais to the West Woodburn pavement, improvement will be made this fall. The balance of the work from that point to the Pacific highway by the Checkerboard station will be done some time during the present five year program, Roadmaster Johnson states.

The gravel for the improvement will have to come from the Pierce-Collard plant or the Fairfield plant. The Fairfield plant is not working the Collard plant is now finishing up on gravel for the Million dollar highway which will be done Saturday, and there will be a week's work ahead of that for district gravel. Johnson states that if he is able to secure the gravel while good weather maintains, it will only require about two weeks work on the section of the Checkerboard highway to be put in this year, as the road is level and straight and it will be mostly work with a caterpillar.

BUILDING MAY RISE ON FRONT AND COURT SOON

Negotiations are now under way between the Roth Grocery company and a party not named to lease the space at Front and Court streets for a parking space, and in event these negotiations are not completed a one-story building containing eight store rooms will be erected on the property. Those rooms which have stood there for years have been pulled down, the last one being nearly wrecked. The houses stood on concrete foundations and these foundations will be cleared away, Manager Schunke of the grocery company stated Friday.

The property was acquired by the Roth Grocery company eight years ago at a cost of \$19,000, this being \$17,500 for the land and \$1500 for the pavement. At the time the plan was to construct a warehouse on the property but this matter was later solved by the Willamette Grocery company erecting a large warehouse at Trade and Cottage streets.

"We believe the deal for automobiles is a parking place for automobiles will go through," stated Mr. Schunke. "But if it doesn't we have definitely decided to place a building on the property for the use of small stores or businesses that do not demand a more central location in the commercial section."

"The property has a frontage of 165 feet on Court street and runs along 31 1/2 feet of Front street. This would permit eight store buildings each 2 1/2 feet deep, with a width of 20 feet for each one."

ECONOMIC VALUES OF HEALTH STATED

Economic values of health were presented by the Lions club Friday noon by Dr. Estella Ford Warner, of the county health unit, who held that better methods of living and sanitation and the control of communicable diseases responsible for the general improvement throughout the nation and community.

Control of communicable diseases in Marion county were emphasized, with the last death from diphtheria occurring June 30, 1927, while the average for the three previous years was from 17 to 20. This period, she said, was before immunization was in force. Infant death rate per 1000 births has decreased from 55.1 in 1920 to 37.5 in 1923 while ammalpox cases have been reduced from 181 to 26, outside of institutional cases, in the last four years.

Work of the health unit can be continued at a per capita cost of 63 cents, Dr. Warner said in conclusion.

NEW EXTENSION CLASSES HERE ARE ANNOUNCED

Several new classes under the leadership of a number of new instructors will be offered in the Salem extension center of the University of Oregon extension department, according to plans announced late Thursday by W. G. Beattie, of Eugene, director of the extension division, who was in town making preliminary arrangements. Class work in the Salem extension center will begin September 30 and as usual classes will meet in the senior high school building.

Superintendent George W. Hug of the Salem schools, has been secured by the university to teach two classes in health education. One will meet at four o'clock and the second at 7:15 on Thursdays.

Dean Roy Hewitt of the Willamette university law school, will teach a class in industrial relations at 7:15 every Tuesday evening. Dean Frank Erickson, also a member of the Willamette faculty, will give a new course in "Education as a state function," at 7:15 every Wednesday evening. Dean Erickson's class has been planned at this time particularly because of the state-wide interest in the cabinet form of government which will be presented to the electorate for adoption or refusal next year.

Miss Victoria Avakian of the University of Oregon art department will give a class in design at 7:15 Thursday evenings. A pottery course may be introduced during the winter term. Miss Avakian taught here two years ago.

Dr. Rudolf Ernst, considered one of the best informed men on literature on the Eugene campus, will come to Salem every Friday evening to teach a class in "Main Tendency."
