Albany—Eighty members of the Linn county 4-H clubs were guests of honor at the Albany Kiwanis club at their luncheon this week. Eight members of the Salem Kiwanis club were present as was a delegation from Dallas. President Ralph Cooley of the Salem club, Hon. Sam Koser and Dr. Henry Morris made brief talks thanking the Albany club for its cooperation in the recent annual district convention of the club held in Salem.

Four-H members who attended the luncheon had competed in the fair in the livestock, poultry and domestic science departments. Over 200 club members competed this year. D. B. Fales announced, but not all were able to attend.

Another feature of the meeting was the presence of two national 4-H club champions: Alex Cruickshank of McMinnville, who won the Moses trophy at Chicago in 1927, and Edgar Grimes, of Harrisburg, who won the trophy, bringing it back to Oregon in 1928.

there are more entries for the night horse show than ever before; possibly the larger space assigned to carnival attractions has something to do with it; or maybe the building of more classy and more thrilling vaudeville and circus acts. Any of these is a drawing card for bigger crowds, and crowds are what the state fair wants. Anyway the look on the faces of the state fair folk is one of co-mingled eager, expectation and anxious speculation—the speculation being about the weather mainly. Pretty autumn weather would mean a lot to the fair this year; and bad weather—but why bring that up?

Now this goes for everyone around the fair grounds except Ella Wilson, secretary and manager. Here is the same attitude of calm resignation, come what may. It is said that men come and they come while women weep when misfortune comes. But if Ella Wilson ever did either when a solid week of rain delayed the state fair she did it in the solitude of her boudoir. The cheerful stoic—that's Ella Wilson.

The state fair really will open Sunday. On that day an admission of 25 cents—half fare—will be charged. All exhibits won't be ready for inspection nor all carnival attractions on the grounds, but there will be music on the grounds for the entertainment of the comers. It has been the custom for some years to open the fair on Sunday, and usually 4000 or 5000 persons enter the grounds on that day.

Monday, however, is the big day, for it will be Community Club and Dedication day, the latter having reference to the dedication of the new grandstand and exhibit building that started recently over against Lone Oak track.

Twenty-six community clubs, from Multnomah, Washington, Marion, and Clackamas counties will be on the grounds, most of them arriving at 10:30 o'clock, and the famous Hubbard band will give a concert immediately upon their arrival. A feature of the day will be community singing led by Dr. D. V. Poling of Albany. The community club members will attend a motion picture show in the boys' and girls' club building at 12 o'clock. This will show various lines of community club work.

At 1:30 o'clock the community clubs will assemble in front of the grandstand where they will compete in stunts, sports and a debating contest on the subject "Why the Oregon State Fair?" Each debater will have three minutes to talk.

Interpreted between the stunts will be the professional circus vaudeville acts contracted for this year's fair—five acts of new stuff. The main feature of this show is the two Aenos and their 85-foot pole act, a thriller that makes the spectators gasp. The Aenos are European novelty performers in this country for the first time. The semi-feature is furnished by the Asaw elephants. These animals are trained by Captain Spencer Huntley, and the act is so perfected that the big animals have scarcely a word of direction from the trainer. TWO KILLED, SEVEN HURT IN STREET ROW

Mexico City (AP)—Two men were killed and seven were injured Friday night in a street fight between followers of Jose Vasconcelos, the anti-reactionist candidate for president, and the supporters of Pascual Ortiz Rubio, candidate of the national revolutionary party.

The fight started when 200 anti-reactionists staged a demonstration in behalf of their candidate, arousing the anger of the Ortizistas. The Ortizistas first fired into the air and then into the ranks of the anti-reactionists.

Vasconcelos' followers contended they were unarmed. A detachment of mounted police quelled the riot and later barred traffic from streets in the vicinity. None of the Ortizistas was injured.

Touching an electric wire in the Darlington, England, rolling mills workshop recently, a black kitten threw the plant out of gear and 60 men out of work, soon after a mouse had caused the same trouble in a nearby mill.

The new grandstand, which is combined with an exhibit pavilion, has a capacity of 5500. It is of concrete construction, fireproof throughout, with chairs instead of benches. The building was erected at a cost of \$150,000 and pains have been taken to make it an attractive building as one of the highest utility. The roof is so designed that spectators can see airplane attractions that are often featured.

The exhibit space in the building, with a beautifully-designed entrance facing the main grounds, is beneath the seating space. In addition to exhibit booths this is equipped with all the conveniences that add to the comfort of patrons.

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ARSON CAUSES \$135,000 LOSS TO INDUSTRIES

Malden, Mass. (AP)—Three incendiary fires occurring in rapid succession caused damage estimated at \$135,000 Saturday.

Two firemen were injured, one perhaps fatally, while fighting the flames, which drove 30 families from adjoining tenement blocks. Aid was summoned from Medford, Everett, Melrose, Revere and Chelsea. Hundreds of volunteers assisted.

The first fire occurred at the woodworking mill of F. A. Melanson, where flames swept a warehouse used for the storage of kind-dried lumber. Damage was estimated at \$35,000.

Shortly afterward fire broke out at the Malden Grain company's building not far from the scene of the first fire. Damage was \$75,000. Firemen Pete Kelleher of engine No. 1 was struck on the head and seriously injured.

Firemen on the roof of the grain building discovered the third fire in the Hammond Lumber company's plant. Loss was estimated at \$25,000.

Portland (AP)—George H. Buck, flying Varny air mail plane which left Portland late Friday for Salt Lake City, was forced down at Weiser, Idaho, about 10 o'clock Friday night. Buck was shaken up and his plane was damaged. Poor visibility and motor trouble were given as the cause by Buck in a telephone conversation with Varny headquarters here Saturday morning.
