

WOODBURN MILL OLD LAND MARK CHANGES HANDS

Woodburn—John W. Shaw of Orchard, Wash., has purchased the building, land and machinery of the Woodburn Milling company, which is one of the oldest industries in Woodburn and has been in the Scott family since it was first started.

The mill was built in 1891 by Robert H. Scott, Sr., father of the present Robert H. Scott and was operated by Scott, Sr., until his death in 1897 at which time the son took charge. Later John F. Steelhammer was associated with Scott in the business but sold his interests several years ago.

Robert H. Scott, Sr., was born in Scotland and at the age of 21 emigrated to Canada where he learned the milling business. He came to the United States in 1896 and lived for 10 years at Westport. In 1896 he moved from Westport to Scotts Mills, which place was named for him, and operated a mill there for many years, making flour by the old process. In 1898 he changed this mill to the roller process and afterward sold it to Dr. H. J. Minthorn, an uncle of President Hoover. After selling this mill the family moved to Woodburn where the present building of the Woodburn Milling company was erected and has been one of the leading industries of Woodburn for many years.

Mr. Shaw expects to improve the plant by the installation of new machinery and will rearrange the interior. He will be assisted by Mr. Scott for a time and the people of Woodburn hope Mr. and Mrs. Scott will remain in Woodburn permanently as they are citizens that the town cannot afford to lose. Mr. Shaw will be joined by his wife and family this week and will occupy the Beebe house in Cupid's court.
