

RURAL HOMES DESTROYED BY RECENT FIRES

Albany—The farm home of William Rogers, three miles north of here, burned to the ground Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Defective wiring was thought to have caused the fire.

The family was in the house when they heard a noise upstairs, and upon investigating found the whole upstairs in flames. The Mr. Rogers fire department was called but they were unable to save the house. The buildings close by were all saved.

A few household articles were saved, but all the bedding and clothes were burned. There was \$1000 insurance carried on the house.

Rogers moved here a year ago from the east and purchased the place from Wallinga. They moved their belongings into the Frank Ewert house.

Hubbard—The Hubbard fire department was called to the Needy district where the large 2-story and basement home of Clarence Kropp burned to the ground, only some household goods being saved.

The firemen were able to keep the outbuildings from burning but arrived too late to check the house fire which it is presumed originated from the fine fire. The family was a short distance away at the home of a neighbor when they saw smoke at their home. The fire truck was manned by George Grimes, E. O. Erickson and Hugh Wells.
