TAX LEVY SET LOWER IN LINN

Albany—Linn county's tax levy will be a little over three mills less for 1929 than it was for 1928 in spite of increase of some requirements. It was learned after Linn county officials began the task of compiling the 1929 budget.

The cut in levy results from the fact that there are budget requirements outside of the six per cent limitation clause of the state constitution.

Two items which the budget provided for last year, both of which were outside the six per cent limitation are the sinking fund for retirement of the 1919 road bonds and interest and the levy voted by the people in the primary election of May, 1928, for the Santiam highway.

SMITH HUGHES TEAM RETURNS FROM BIG SHOW

Silverton—Sixty Smith-Hughes high school stock judging teams of the five northwest states entered the annual judging contest at the Pacific International livestock show at Portland Saturday.

Silverton was represented by Warren E. Crabtree, judging coach; Johnnie Nicol, Clifton Hadley and James Neal.

In the judging contest Canby, Ore., came out first with 2,422 points. Yakima, Wash., second with 2,416 points and Molalla, third with 2,370 points. Canby will represent the state of Oregon at the national Smith-Hughes contest to be held at the American Royal show at Kansas City.

The Silverton boys stood in 29th place, having made 2,291 points; Nicol making 761, Clifton Hadley 734 and James Neal 793 points.

Milton Kleinmuth of Canby was high man at the contest of 190 boys and so won a gold medal offered by the Portland Union stock yards.

At the Smith-Hughes banquet in the new J. C. Penney hall, which was a \$10,000 gift to all junior grade and high school vocational activities.

Among the speakers at this banquet were R. H. Kipp, of the Portland chamber of commerce who was toastmaster; C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, who was the main speaker of the evening; O. D. Adams, state director of vocational education, and O. M. Plummer, secretary of the Pacific international livestock show.

After the banquet more than 300 Smith-Hughes students and workers were each given a ticket for the night horse show.

The Smith-Hughes banner which adorns the flag staff of the new J. C. Penney hall is an especially designed flag with the national emblem of the future farmers of America and the letters P. F. A. The colors of the banner are gold and black.
