most modest quarters here in loneliness, poverty and disillusionment. Just a month ago she was forced to auction off heirlooms of great value to pay the debts of her adventurer husband, but she succeeded in raising only a small amount. Bankruptcy proceedings previously had been instituted against her when she failed to meet obligations contracted by Zukoff. At one time she was wealthy in her own name.

By her first marriage the former princess was princess of Schumburg Lippe, wife of Prince Adolphus of that house. He died in 1916, and for years she lived side by side with other members of the Hohenzollern and Schumburg Lippe families; all suffered reverses as result of the war, of course, but their lot was exalted compared to what awaited Victoria.

In 1927 she met Zukoff, 29 years old, who was said to have represented himself to her as a Russian emigre of good family, but was believed really to have been the son of a cobbler, and to have worked at such professions as waiter and gigolo in a Paris dance hall.

The princess, then 61 years old, and he, were married despite the opposition of the former Kaiser, and others of her family who forced her to renounce her royal standing before she went ahead with the latter-life romance.
