HARD HITTING BOYS TO MEET IN MAIN EVENT

Two hard-hitting, fast-stepping boys will face each other next Wednesday night at the armory when Pat Dundee and Art Akers square away for their ten round main event show. Matchmaker Plant announced Wednesday that he had signed the two local scrappers for his next card. That the bout will be a whirlwind affair is predicted by all.

Akers' stock has risen rapidly since his knockout defeat of Johnny Hawks of Seattle last Wednesday, while Dundee has shown speed and cleverness in his recent encounters.

Dundee will likely have a two pound weight advantage, as he will come in at 141, while Akers will probably make 139. Akers was considerably weakened for his last bout when he went into a steam bath and took off seven pounds just before entering the ring. However, fans pointed out that it was a good thing Art was weakened. "If he had had his full strength he would have murdered Hawks," they say.

A call for volunteers Tuesday to undergo a blood transfusion operation in an effort to save Luoma's life, was answered by 14 students of the university. Hugh Clark Jr., of Dunsmuir was selected for the operation, which however proved futile.

TROJANS MAY BE SQUAD TO STOP HOOSIERS

New York (AP)—On the already well established theory that they do come back, even if it takes a trip of 2,000 miles for the purpose, Southern California's Trojan figure to be the team to stop Notre Dame's rush Saturday before some 120,000 spectators at Soldier Field, Chicago.

On the also well-established fact that Notre Dame, even with Knute Rockne able to direct them only on a part time basis, has turned out the greatest Hoosier array since the "Four Horsemen," the unchecked South Bend cyclone figures to sweep over the Trojans and on toward a national championship.

Those who like the chances of southern California see the Trojans bounding across the country to atone for their unexpected setback at the hands of California. U. S. C. has finished its big-game schedule on the coast and can "shoot the works" against Notre Dame, whereas the Hoosiers still have Northwestern and the Army to worry about.

Notre Dame, on the other hand, has taken its last two games "in stride" to be at the peak for Southern California. For the first time since beating Carnegie, Rockne himself will be on the sidelines, even though his ailing leg will keep him in a wheel chair. The psychology of this alone will be a big stimulant to the Hoosiers.

St. Mary's, After Coast Triumphs, Yearns For Intersectional Battle

San Francisco (UP)—"Sure, and they can't forget us!" That is the refrain wafted on the breeze these days from the depths of Moraga valley—where St. Mary's grid-

ders practice the art of football. And Pacific coast fans, at least, are not forgetting the big team from the little school, for the Gaels have exhibited this season a squad of players who have neither been defeated nor scored upon.

Protection of its goal line has become a mania with the Gael squad and the team that shoves across a touchdown will have to play more inspired football than St. Mary's has yet encountered.

The Gaels have played a scoreless tie with California, the Pacific coast conference leader, have beaten the Olympic club, Gonzaga, St. Ignace and Santa Clara and have yet to meet Nevada, U. C. L. A. and Oregon.

They intend to finish out their schedule with decisive wins, and all indications at present are that they will do so, and then play an intersectional game that will earn them the national recognition they desire.

Officials at the Moraga valley institution are known to have laid plans for an intersectional game, providing St. Mary's comes through the season with a clean slate.

University of Kentucky has been mentioned as a probable opponent and Los Angeles interests are attempted to arrange a game with either Texas, Tulane, Vanderbilt or Cornell for Christmas day.

WEST RETAINS SUPREMACY IN FOOTBALL PLAY

New York (AP)—Supremacy of the west over the east in football is again in evidence this season, if the intersectional games can be taken as a basis of comparison.

Seven out of ten intersectional games between the east and west have resulted in victories for the westerners.

Two of the east's three victories were scored by the University of Pittsburgh's unbeaten eleven, probably the strongest combination in the eastern region. Pitt beat Ohio State 18 to 2, and Nebraska, 12 to 7. The other eastern victory was scored by Colgate over Indiana, 21 to 6.

Scores of the seven more prominent western victories follow: California 12, Pennsylvania 7. Illinois 17, Army 7. Michigan 14, Harvard 12. Nebraska 13, Syracuse 6. Notre Dame 14, Navy 7. Chicago 15, Princeton 7. Wisconsin 13, Colgate 6.
