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School Board Scales Down Preliminary Budget Estimates

With the first rough draft showing estimated resources of \$320,232 and estimated expenses, exclusive of debt service, at \$322,000, the preliminary session on the 1929-30 school budget conducted at the school board meeting Tuesday night was devoted to a close scrutiny of items which might possibly be reduced from the first estimated cost.

Superintendent George W. Hug, in submitting the tentative subject to revision as more accurate figures on a number of items would be received later in the week.

Bonded indebtedness is the most uncertain item in the budget, depending on whether the school board is called to meet the redemption of bonds and interest amounting to \$24,640 or if they will be allowed

to pay \$10,000 this year and \$14,640 next year. They have been paying \$10,000 each year since 1910. The total payment of principal and interest on bonds will be between \$77,000 and \$91,000.

The estimate for school health service at \$1100, included in the first draft, was later found to be for the full year of 1930, and inasmuch as the proposed school budget covers from June 30, 1929 to June 30, 1930, the allowance can be cut in half or to \$550.

Salaries total will reach \$223,793, which must be met as the teachers are under contract. Salaries for the grade school teachers are \$375 less this year than last, but both junior high and senior high salary budgets reach a slightly higher total than last year. General control is estimated at \$9,350; instruction supervision at \$32,500; and operation of plant about \$32,000. It was found Wednesday that the \$3500 allotted to cover insurance more than covered the subject, as \$2400 will give complete coverage.

Estimated receipts show \$61,500 from the county school fund; \$10,000 from the state school fund; \$34,000 from the elementary school fund; \$2,600 from the vocational department; \$400 from the high school tuition; \$37,000 from the high school tuition fund; \$1,500 from a variety of sources; making a total of \$147,000. This will be added to \$173,232 by the six per cent tax limitation.

The school budget will be passed on Tuesday evening, November 19, by a committee of citizens, including David Eyre, W. H. Dancy, William Gahndorff, U. C. Shipley and Frank Hughes, with William Evans and William McGilchrist, Jr., as alternates. This will be the final meeting before the budget is submitted to the tax payers at the annual budget meeting in December.

Mrs. T. S. Roberts, Miss Elizabeth Levy and Mrs. Bessie Bush, educational committee from the Salem music teachers' association, appeared before the school board to request that should the group-teaching proposition submitted to the board several weeks ago be adopted, that all music teachers be given an opportunity at the instructional posts.

With a total of 76 births in Marion county during the month of October and a total of 54 deaths in the same period of time, the monthly report of the county health unit submitted to the county health unit committee, luncheon Wednesday noon at the Marion hotel show Marion county still gaining in population. The total births for the year, to date, is 698; and the total deaths is 537.

There have been 12 cases of chickenpox in Marion county during October 1 case of diphtheria, 11 of mumps, 3 of scarlet fever, 1 of typhoid, 4 of whooping cough, 1 of pneumonia, 7 of tuberculosis, 2 of venereal diseases, 2 of erysipelas and 1 of septic sore throat. One death each has occurred from pneumonia, septic sore throat and bronchial pneumonia, and 4 from tuberculosis, including cases and deaths of Marion county residents in state institutions.

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AARON BRENNER TURNED LOOSE BY KIDNAPPERS

Tiensten, China (AP)—Aaron Brenner, New York furrier, arrived here Wednesday morning after nearly a week's captivity in the hands of kidnappers, believed to be Russians.

He was in a highly nervous condition and unable to give a coherent account of what had happened to him.

A telephone message was received after he arrived at his home to the effect that "there are 30 of us, and that they would get revenge if his 'promise is not kept.'"

It was believed the "promise" was to pay the ransom demand which finally was reduced to \$50,000 since Joseph Brenner, brother of the furrier, denied any ransom had been paid to secure his release.

Police were said to be aware of the identity of the kidnappers, and to have located three of them in the Chinese district adjoining the English concession. A raid was planned for Wednesday morning.

It was believed the gang became frightened at the closeness of police investigation and permitted the captive to escape.

The case of Ruth Ryan against Associated Truck lines in which she asked for \$25,000 in general and \$350 in special damages, for an accident five miles south of the city on the Pacific highway April 13, 1928, went to the jury in circuit court before Judge Kelly Wednesday afternoon.
