Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 8:15 o'clock from St. Mary's church here for Francis J. Ficker, 59 years of age, who died at the family residence here Saturday noon.

Mr. Ficker was prominent in city affairs here. He was a member of the city council for more than seven years, and chairman of the school board for a number of years.

Francis J. Ficker was born June 29, 1870, in Austria. When he was 10 years of age, he came with his parents to Odlin, Wash., where they lived on a large ranch.

Business houses were closed between 8 and 9 o'clock, during the funeral services of Francis J. Ficker.
