Waldo Hills Club Opened With Dedication Program At New Home On Thursday

Waldo Hills—One of the biggest moments this community has ever experienced was that Thursday evening when the Waldo Hills Community club, which was organized December 1, 1928, opened its new clubhouse.

This club house is of great interest not only here but at Salem and Silverton as well. The Waldo Hills community is one of the historic communities of the Willamette valley. It became known years ago as the home of Homer Davenport, the famous cartoonist, and from the windows of the new club hall the old home of Davenport can be seen.

The hall is built on an acre of land donated by Mrs. Eugene Morton now living in Honolulu. The actual work of building the hall was done by 41 members who put in 312 days of work. The auditorium of the hall is 30 by 50 feet and has a full basement underneath it. There is a stage 13 by 30 feet, a ladies dressing room, 10 by 10 feet, and a lobby 10 by 20 feet. The building is made up of 30,000 feet of lumber, 25,000 shingles, 500 pounds of nails and 56 yards of concrete. The cash outlay for materials is \$1800.50. This was partly donated by Silverton and Salem business men. The balance was raised by selling shares.

Frank Bower, president of the club, who acted as chairman of the opening evening, said in speaking of the principles of the club, "We intend to run this as a dry club. We do not intend to go out and try to reform folks in their own homes. How they live there is their own business. But we have seen 'wet' clubs fail and we would rather die of drought than drown."

Charles Reynolds of Silverton in speaking of community spirit remarked that the Waldo Hills community spirit extended into both Silverton and Salem. L. Arlich of Salem spoke briefly of days gone by when he too was a member of this community. Charles Archer, also of Salem, spoke chiefly to the younger people and children, "the people," he said, "who would be members of this club 50 years from now."

Elam Amstutz, a former Waldo Hills boy, but now a Portland attorney, was present and spoke encouragingly of the future of the club.

Musical numbers were given by Mrs. W. F. Krenz and Mrs. Flora Headrick who gave vocal solos, and by the talented young violinist, Byrill Ottoway.

Following the program a social hour was enjoyed during which lunch was served by the members of the Willard Woman's club.
