Concert Thursday Impressive

A Christmas gift to Salem music devotees which will long be remembered with a genuine thrill of pleasure was the exceptionally fine concert presented by the Salem chamber music society in the Woman's clubhouse on North Cottage street Thursday evening. The program was particularly appropriate to the coming season, and was given in a charming setting which enhanced the holiday spirit.

Susie Pennel Pipes, director and first violin; Herbert Sorenson, second violin; Alexander Vdovin, viola; and Ferdinand Konrad, violoncello, all members of the Portland string quartet which presented the program under the auspices of the local society, are a musical unit who perform with the balance and exquisite blending of a great organ. They are superb artists.

The four movements of Haydn's quartet op. 76, No. 3, were received with delight for the number is a great favorite with Salem folk. The second movement, poco adagio cantabile, familiar through its being used as a hymn, was endowed with a dignity and solemn reverence which accentuated its beauty. The melody was carried by each instrument in turn while a delicate tracery was wound about it with a light, intricate touch. The minuetto, with its stately charm, and the other two movements, allegro and presto, each had their distinct themes, elaborated upon by the coordinating instruments.

The lovely tone poem, Arensky's variations on his opus 35, A minor, was outstanding number of the evening. It faithfully pantomimed the Russian legend of the Christ child who planted a rose bush, and of the cruel children who stripped it of the blooms and left the thorns alone for a crown. The cello, with its rich, sombre notes, was especially effective in the tone poem. The theme is haunting, and was developed faithfully and with brilliancy, sparkling with many facets. The theme was played again by the quartet for an encore after insistent demands by the audience.

The concluding number of the program was Dvorak's ever-popular "Negro" quartet op. 96. It is conceded that no one has surpassed Dvorak in his sympathetic understanding and treatment of the special type of negro melodies; and assuredly the Salem audience had never heard Dvorak's quartet interpreted with such sincerity and real beauty as that offered Thursday night. The mad gaiety of the negro, the abrupt change of the melancholy and abysmal loneliness of soul, the superstition, and sensitiveness, the temperamental rhythm and tempo that characterize the total interpretation of negro life and places it apart from all other races, was impressed and delineated with clear-cut realism by the Portland string quartet.

The third and last of the series of concerts being sponsored by the chamber music society will be held early in the spring.

Modern Art Topic of Speaker

William Gray Purcell, Portland architect who is president of Oregon Artists and art editor of the Spectator gave an informal talk to members of the Salem Arts League and their guests at the auditorium of the city library Wednesday night. Mr. Purcell, who was introduced by Mrs. Richard Cartwright, president of the league, spoke on modern art, which he described as unique in that it strove not to copy but to be original, to advance one idea or thought and not to crowd.

The prominent Portland artist stated that the supreme test of a good picture was whether or not a person got tired of it. He declared the tendency of modern art toward obscenity, stating that the effort to adequately describe realities and to be truthful should be directed towards cleanliness and uplifting. Modern art, in Mr. Purcell's talk, was traced through painting, architecture, sculpture, writing, and all kindred branches. He also gave a resume of the different types of architecture.

Mr. Purcell was enthusiastic over the art exhibit and contest being sponsored by Portland artists, with each competitor being assigned a subject, a definite size, and five articles to place in his composition. The medium is left entirely to the artist. The pictures will not be named nor will the artist be known until after prizes have been awarded.

The movement for an art museum which is now being fostered by the Salem Arts league was encouraged by Mr. Purcell, who advised the members to start on a small scale, the project advancing as the need arose.

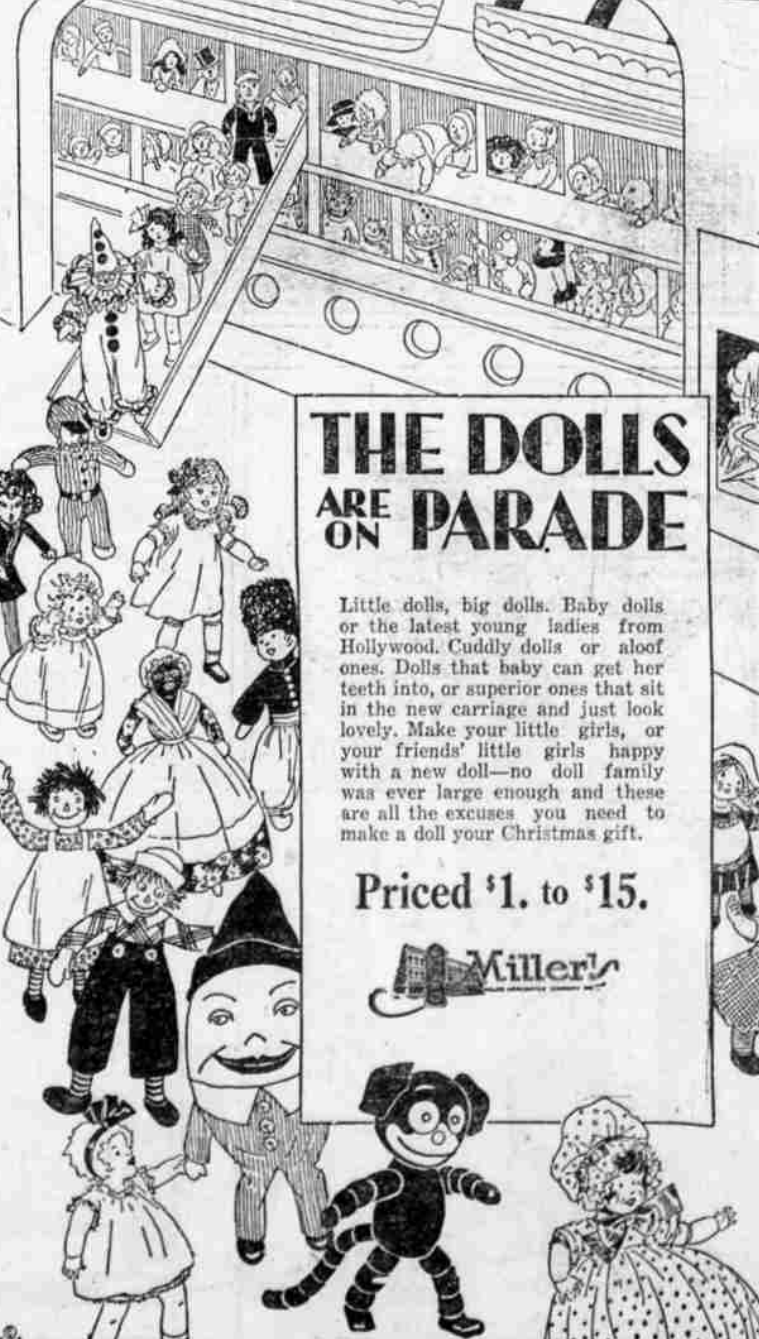
