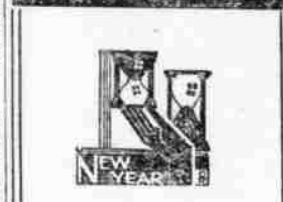
CLINIC INSPECTIONS GETTING UNDER WAY
