

UNIVERSITY HIGH TO PLAY SALEM HERE TUESDAY

SQUAD COACHED BY RIDINGS OF OREGON FAME

Coached by Ridings, former Oregon star, the University high basketball squad will come here Tuesday evening for a contest with Salem high's quintet. Although the game will not have any bearing on the district championship, the contest will serve in a measure to size up the abilities of the local players and those of Eugene high.

University high won from Cottage Grove a week ago, then Saturday night fell before the onslaughts of Eugene. The purple and white had little difficulty in defeating Coach Ridings' youngsters, the final count being 39 to 16.

University has always given Salem real battles, at one time taking an almost certain championship from the team in the semi-finals of the state tournament series.

Bone, who has been playing with Klamath at forward, plays a nice floor game but up to date has not been effective at shooting. If he or Foreman can improve in this department of the game, many predict Salem will be a hard team to head off.

According to reports from Eugene the University high squad seemed to be lacking in fundamentals although the players had considerable speed. McAlister and Clark did most of the scoring.

SUNDAY GOLF UNDER FIRE IN GREAT BRITAIN

Epsom (AP)—Members of the English society for Lord's day observance are launching an inspired campaign against Sunday golf. They assert that the ancient Scottish game is revolutionizing Sunday habits and may lead Great Britain along the same trail followed by Rome.

H. H. Martin, secretary of the society, says in an article given to London newspapers, "Sunday sport is the deadliest enemy of the Sabbath, and the worst offender in this respect is Sunday golf."

"Golf is being substituted for God. The language heard on golf courses on Sunday is not in keeping with the spirit of the day. Especially vile is the speech at the last bunker. When an easy shot is missed, or the score added, words of profanity are used."

"In short: Sunday golf causes the higher nature of man to suffer loss; it does injury to our fellow man; and it does disservice to the community."

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700,000 Trout Freed In Many Streams Of Marion, Linn Counties

Some 700,000 eastern brook and rainbow trout have been planted in various western Oregon streams during the past four weeks, according to statistics compiled by Dr. A. G. Prill, president of the Santiam Fish and Game Protective association. These fish, for the most part five to six inches in length, were propagated at the Roaring river hatchery under the supervision of Wade Ellis and have been distributed through the direction of Matt Ryckman, superintendent of the game commission's fish hatcheries.

The fish tank car of the commission has been in charge of Ray Kincaid, assisted by Ellis and Elgin of the local hatchery.

DEMPSEY PICKS JACK SHARKEY AS BEST HEAVY

New York (AP)—Jack Sharkey is the best American heavyweight and the accredited world's champion for 1930, Jack Dempsey said Monday in a copyrighted article in "The Ring," boxing magazine.

Dempsey says he believes that Sharkey can keep the title in this country, but that if Sharkey cannot, he will return to the ring and keep the title in America.

"I'm inclined to believe that my second fight with Tunney was my farrowest to the ring," Dempsey said, "but if a foreigner gains the world's title, I may be prompted to reconsider, for I still believe I am master of the present crop."

Dempsey made this statement in connection with his selections for "The Ring," of the leading fighters in all divisions, formerly an annual task of the late Tex Rickard.

Max Schmeling of Germany, is rated as the outstanding foreign contender.

Wilson said he would come to Chicago within 10 days to seek permission from William L. Veck, president of the Cubs, to fight the Great One for the honor of the National league—and \$15,000.

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OHIO GOLFER TAKES LEAD IN ANGELES OPEN

Los Angeles (AP)—Half a hundred select wanderers of the nation's fairways Monday put two distressing rounds of golf over the rain-soaked wind-swept Riviera course behind them as they prepared to continue play in the Los Angeles \$10,000 open tournament, cheered by the prospect of a clear sky.

A young professional from Columbus, Ohio, Denny Shute, who Sunday conquered the treacherous course and the plotting elements to shoot a 74, three over par, headed this array of qualifiers with a score of 147, this giving him a two stroke advantage over his nearest rival, young Horton Smith of the Missouri Ozarks.

Grouped with MacDonald Smith, the defending champion, and Guici, Horton grimly fought his way through for a 76 while his partners took 82 and 84 respectively.

MacDonald Smith turned in a 159 for the 36 holes, just enough to permit him to stay for the third and final rounds Monday and Tuesday.

The best eighteen was chalked up for Neil Christian, Portland, Ore., pro, the exponent from the north-west also having the favor of the elements when he shot a 73 for a 122 standing. His in-card included four consecutive birdies.

After his arrival at the hospital a consultation was held by Doctors George W. Fish, J. Bentley Squire, Robert J. Shea and Carnes Weeks. It was agreed to perform the operation on Tunney's right kidney at 3 p. m.

Portland (AP)—Northern conference basketball teams will continue play Monday night with Idaho playing at Eugene and Washington State meeting Oregon Agricultural at Corvallis in the first of two game series at each place. All teams will play again Tuesday night.

Close of the first series in conference play this season found all teams with the exception of Washington which will meet Oregon Agricultural at Seattle Friday in the initial game, tied for first place. Oregon and Washington State split the initial series when Oregon came back Saturday night in an overtime period to nose out the Cougars, 34 to 32. Oregon Aggies turned on Idaho Saturday night and won, 43 to 27.

In the southern division, U. C. L. A. leads the standings with a 63 to 30 victory over Stanford. California and U. S. C. are in a tight race.
