

GOVERNOR GIVEN ROYAL WELCOME AT WOODBURN

OVER 200 ARE FORUM GUESTS ST. LUKE HALL

Woodburn—Gov. has no terror for Oregon's governor, nor for the members of the Woodburn chamber of commerce, judging from the immense crowd that gathered at St. Luke's hall Wednesday evening. The banquet began at 6:30 o'clock and covers were placed for 200. Every place was filled and it was necessary to place additional covers for late comers.

Following a brief business session Governor A. W. Norblad was introduced by John P. Hunt. The governor stated that he had never before seen such an exhibition of community comradeship as that exhibited in Woodburn. He told of some of his early experiences which have given him an understanding of every day problems and his intention to apply this knowledge to matters of state. His entire address was along those lines expressed by his slogan, "Pull for Oregon or pull out." He told of the part historical events in Oregon have played in the history of the advancement of the United States, and stated that the time is coming when Oregon will be the front door instead of the back door to America. During his talk he paid a touching tribute to the late Governor Patterson.

During the banquet a musical program was given by students of Mt. Angel academy and normal under the direction of Sister M. Genevieve. Their numbers were "Bandman" by the chorus, with Dorothy Murphy accompanying. Vocal solo by Angela Catrine, accompanied by Amanda Schwab; piano solo by Amanda Schwab, vocal duet, Marion Holmes and Lucille Travis, Dorothy Murphy accompanying; vocal trio, Rose Schwab, Marion Holmes and Lucille Travis, with Amanda Schwab accompanying. Members of the chorus each wore a sash with the word "Norblad" in gold letters across the front of their dress and the woman in the center carried the governor's famous slogan.

A rising vote of thanks was extended by the club to governor for his presence and inspiring address and to Sister Genevieve and the young women for their enjoyable program. George Keys, chairman of the committee on arrangements, also expressed the thanks of the committee to the speaker, to Father Rubis for his courtesy, to the people for the splendid attendance and to the young women for their music.

During the business session reports were received from the various committees. John P. Hunt, chairman of the turkey day committee reported the cash received for that purpose as \$198 and the amount expended \$126.40, leaving a balance towards next year's program of \$72.30. His report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Dr. Gerald Smith reported the expense of the community Christmas tree as \$8 for which \$10 had been allowed.

Blaine McCord of the Boy Scout committee reported that the first week in February would be the anniversary of the organization of the local troop and that much progress had been made. A motion was made and carried that the registration fee of the six members of this committee be paid in order that their names may be placed on the official record in Washington.

P. L. Love, chairman of the labor committee reported the success of their efforts in conferring with the gas company for the use of local men in installing gas mains and that 100 men had registered for work in digging the gas line which will begin as soon as the weather moderates.

Keith Powell reported the national guard activities and the amount of money brought into the community from this source which totals more than \$6,700 every year. A vote of thanks was given to the state training school for its help in putting up and taking down the community Christmas tree. This motion was placed before the assembly by H. F. Butterfield.

President W. H. Baile appointed E. J. Allen, Clyde Whitman and Jess Fikan as a committee on arrangements for the February meeting.
