

WATERLESS NIGHTS ARE BEING FACED BY DALLAS

RESERVE WATER SUPPLY IS LOW SOEHREN FINDS

Dallas—The city council met in the city hall Monday evening for a short meeting with Mayor Left Finckel, presiding.

W. L. Soehren, in charge of the Dallas Water works gave a brief outline of the dangerous situation of the city's water supply, stating the reservoirs were getting low due to the water freezing at the intakes and also due to the excessive amount of water used by the people who allow their faucets to run all night so that the pipes will not freeze.

Mr. Soehren said that if the reservoirs go much lower he will be forced to shut off all water during the night and may have to ask the mill, packing plants, and other local industries to close for several days.

He brought forward a plan to solve the problem by sending a notice to each water user asking for conservation, this notice to be signed by the mayor. The plan was accepted and passed by the mayor. No other business appearing the meeting was adjourned.

Father Charles Ends Long Time Among Indians

St. Benedict—Friends at Mt. Angel college have just finished exchanging greetings with Father Charles Moser, O. S. B., Indian missionary from the west coast of Vancouver Island, B. C., who has just returned from his post among the Indians. Taking up his post among the Indians of Clayoquot in 1900 he was soon placed in charge of the larger bands of Indians living about Hesquiat and the more northern sections of the island. In the present year he has completed an unbroken 30 years of service with the Indians.

Residents of Vancouver Island, Protestants and Catholics alike, and travelers will miss the picturesque figure of the venerable missionary. His long experience with the Indians and knowledge of the coast always made him a welcome entertainer among tourists. He practically built three churches with his own hands. In the early days he was chief shipping master on ships plying those waters and since 1910 was postmaster and telegraph operator for the towns on the coast.

Father Charles did not believe in permitting things to hang heavy on his hands while at Hesquiat, and he made his main hobby one of farming, and while it was the means of furnishing him with the major portion of his own food supply, it also brought him a small income to help defray the expenses of the missions. He established and maintained a herd of cattle and butchered his own beef. Being exceedingly handy in the culinary line, Father Charles would put up in economy jars, for rainy days, dozens of quarts of choice tateroles, etc. As a matter of fact he would always maintain a larder of home canned meat, fish and preserves that would make many a housewife envious.

Besides taking care of the spiritual wants of the Indians and whites alike, Father Charles often had to look after the ill and troubles of all as well, his services being called upon for anything from toothache to a death, and his medical chest, the most important of its contents being opium salts and a sharp knife, was in constant demand.

He has now definitely retired from this diversified career, and will augment the faculty of Mt. Angel college, being well fitted to acquaint a younger generation with many first hand sociological facts about the Indian and his intriguing history. Father Charles is the author of several works dealing with the Indians of western Canada, and he is said to be one of the foremost scholars in Indian dialect, having composed a dictionary of their languages and standardized their expressions.
