Rural Carrier Gives Hints to Mail Customers

The carrier has had many obstacles in his way during the cold weather but has successfully made the trip each day. Some hints are given by which the service could be helped during this kind of weather.

He says: "Did you ever think that a minute lost at each box makes the mail one hour and 49 minutes late to folks on the end of the route? Do you place money loosely in your box and thus cause loss and delay? Use a pincher clothes pin and leave it in the box for stamps and change."

"Have you done your lawful duty and cleaned the snow and other obstacles away to make your box freely accessible to the carrier?"

Postoffice orders are that mail need not be delivered unless the box is fairly free from snow.

"Do you buy a supply of stamps in nice weather to use on stormy days?"

"Do you wrap your letters in a piece of paper to keep them dry when it rains and blowing into a leaky box?"
