For a number of years before coming to this city the family resided in the vicinity between Salem and Silverton. They have resided in this city for the past five years.

Mrs. Murphy was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Loughlin, a pioneer family, who came across the plains in 1850, and settled in Yamhill county.

The remains are at the Keeney Funeral Home awaiting funeral arrangements which will be announced later.

BRIDGE PROGRAM IN LINN COUNTY IS CARRIED OUT

Albany—Linn county's total expenditure in bridges both county and market road totalled \$44,584.22, according to a report submitted by County Engineer C. H. Leonard.

Thirty-eight new county bridges of a total length of 1810 feet were constructed in 1929 at a cost of \$12,314.15, and 66 old county bridges were repaired at a cost of \$15,129.74. Twelve new market road bridges were built totaling 1277 feet in length and at a cost of \$16,080.62, while it cost \$1,059 to repaint and repair a number of market road bridges.
