

## RARE DISEASE PROVES FATAL AT WOODBURN

Woodburn—Ruth Kallak, a sophomore in the Woodburn high school and one of two sisters, died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Kallak, about 11 o'clock Tuesday night from what physicians pronounced as sleeping sickness. This is the second case of this disease to be reported by health authorities during the past year.

Miss Kallak had been ill for the last three weeks and under the care of Dr. Gerald B. Smith and a trained nurse. Dr. Smith's diagnosis was verified by the county health officer and state health officer and every care was taken to prevent contagion. Other doctors observing the case were Dr. Burkes of Portland, successor to Dr. House; Dr. Baum of Salem; Dr. Dowd of Gervais and Dr. Donnelly of Woodburn.

Besides her parents she is survived by a brother, John, and four sisters, Bona, her twin; Mrs. Roy Miller of Hubbard; Margery and Arlene.

Funeral services have not been completed.

## Younger Element in Polk Grooms Walker And Robert Kreason

Intent upon correcting a situation which, they allege, has left Polk county with but little active representation in the state legislature an informal organization of the "younger element" in politics across the river is reported to be actively scanning the prospects of success for a ticket they would like to put into the field at the coming primary election.

On their tentative slate, it is understood, are the names of Mike Walker, Independence hop grower and banker, and Robert Kreason, law partner of Oscar Hayter at Dallas. Walker is being groomed for the race to succeed Senator H. J. Elliott from the Benton-Polk county district, and Kreason is being urged to contest for the seat in the lower house held in the last legislature by S. L. Stewart of Rickreall.

Whether the movement also contemplates a younger and more aggressive incumbent in the house seat from the joint district of Lincoln and Polk counties held by B. F. Swope of Independence, has not been disclosed.

According to the dope which the sponsors of the movement purport to have, Senator Elliott is not hankering for further service in the senate and will not be a candidate for reelection. Walker, they say, is willing to make the sacrifice and spend 40 or 50 days with the lawmakers here next January. But the Stewart-Kreason situation presents a different angle. It was first reported that Stewart was ready and anxious to retire, but of late have come reliable reports that he is reconsidering and offered his service again.

And that, Kreason asserts, would not be particularly offensive to him as he has no particular hankering for legislative service, and has considered to consider being a candidate only at the urging of some of his friends as well as Walker's friends, who see in the Walker-Kreason combination a powerful appeal for votes. Both Kreason and Walker are widely and favorably known in their district and both are prominent in American Legion circles. Both are service-as captains in the world war.

There is still another complication bearing upon Kreason's decision, inasmuch as he is also being loudly mentioned by others of his friends as a potential candidate for considerable strength for the district attorneyship of Polk county, another office to be filled this year. Kreason cannot be said to be entirely adverse to the idea of being district attorney, but he declares he does not want it bad enough to make a campaign for the office, particularly when a campaign as likely will revolve around that particular office. Were the district attorneyship tendered him on a simultaneous basis, he made it unmistakably clear that he does not propose to wade through mud to get there.

Advices from Dallas assert that W. W. Harcombe, present district attorney, is showing no inclination to step aside and surrender his job without a battle, and from Independence issues the news that Lester Barnhart is having his record polished up for the scrutiny of the voters.

## FARMER INSURANCE ASSOCIATION GAINS
