

SEATTLE GETS TASTE OF WAR BY GANGSTERS

Seattle, (AP)—Kidnaped by a gang of bootleggers, a man who had been another under-cover prohibition agent had attempted to trap in a whiskey deal, D. Dunning, one of the agents, was "taken for a ride" and terribly beaten by the gang, three men and two women, shortly after midnight here Wednesday.

Dunning was taken to the city hospital by police, who found him wandering aimlessly about the streets in the south end of the city. He had previously stumbled into M. S. Jackson, a south end resident, whom he requested to notify the police. While Jackson was telephoning headquarters, Dunning wandered away, to be found by a prowler car detail later.

Dunning said that one of the women in the car strangled him, while the other occupants took turns in beating him. He said that he snapped his pistol at them several times, but in each instance the cartridge failed to explode. He said that he was thrown out of the machine at Duwamish, on the highway leading to Tacoma, where the car stalled temporarily. One eye at first reported gouged out, was later reported not to be as seriously injured as at first thought.

The other agent, R. Ginn, said that he and Dunning arranged to meet the suspects in the university district to complete the supposed whiskey deal. Ginn reported that after he was standing on the running board and snatched his handcuffs onto the wrist of one of the men, the man swung at him with his free hand, knocking him to the street. His assailant then leaped out of the machine, a large black touring car, and after kicking him several times as he lay on the street, jumped into the machine, which immediately got under way.

As the car sped away, Ginn said he heard one of the men tell Dunning "we are taking you for a ride." Ginn reported the affair to his chief, William M. Whitney, assistant prohibition director, and police officers throughout the northwest were notified at once to be on the lookout for the car and its occupants.

Washington (AP)—Bathtub exports from the United States for 1929 show a decrease of approximately 10 per cent, says the commerce department, compared with 1928.

The total volume of shipments for each month during 1929 was lower than for the corresponding month of the previous year. Exports in 1929 totaled 1,116,325 tubs compared with an estimate of less than a million for 1929.

PONY COLLEGE IS MAINTAINED IN WISCONSIN

Racine, Wis. (AP)—Welsh and Shetland ponies, reared in the fertile pastures of Kentucky and taught their abcs in Blue Grass equine prep schools, come to Wisconsin for their college education and a diploma which qualifies them for horsemanship positions in the world of horses.

For here in Racine county, the Collins' training school offers all the most advanced courses for the tiny ponies, whose ancestors years ago were graduates of the finest foreign halls of learning.

Operated by Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Collins, native Kentuckians, on their farm near here, the equine college prepares the ponies for next summer's carnivals, circuses and horse shows.

Of the 60 students, Beauty, a trim little Shetland, is the most adept and talented. Under the guidance of Professor Collins she will lie down and play dead, sit on her hind legs, roll a barrel, climb stairs, play marbles, and do a classical front foot dance known as the "High School." Beauty nearly always receives a grade of "A," and her department is the pride of ponyland.

But Beauty is not the only talented pupil attending the Collins' college. There is Shawnee, a "painted" pony who paws out his age; Rose, who poses prettily on a "Patterson," and then bows for applause; Mayflower, whose specialty is sitting on her hind legs like a dog; and Black Gold, whose education is centered upon his barrel rolling proclivities.

Billy, a big black Welsh pony, is dean at the college and is responsible for 100 per cent attendance at classes. Carrying his master, Billy rounds up the ponies and herds them into the school room. After the shaggy students have eaten breakfast and have taken their morning lessons in "Corral hall," they are allowed the freedom of their pastures.

Daily lessons and practice will make the 60 students eligible for graduation by spring. Then proud of carrying their coveted "sheepskins," they will march forth into the realm of "horse business."

GANG LEADER IS MURDERED IN NEW YORK

New York (AP)—The name of Charles (Red) Donnelly, 50-years old, was added Wednesday to the long list of gang leaders who have been slain in the fight for control of the waterfront in the Red Hook district of Brooklyn.

He was ambushed and shot twice in the head by gunmen hidden behind a checker's stand on the pier of the Columbian line.

Two weeks ago Detective William Brown, whose business it is to know the doings of the waterfront gangs, met Donnelly.

"I've been hearing things Red," the detective told the Stevedore Czar, "you had better lay off. It's in the cards that they'll get you some time."

Brown said Donnelly answered his warning with a laugh.

He was watching the ship loaders from whom he extracted tribute Tuesday when a messenger, approached him and said:

"You're strolled down on the pier." Donnelly waited toward the pier. As he passed the checker's booth there were two shots. Loaders working nearby found him dead. The killers had disappeared.

Like that of many of his predecessors, Donnelly's reign was short. Eighteen months ago he was arraigned in homicide court charged with the slaying of his immediate predecessor, Eddie Martin. It was the fifth time he had faced a murder charge and, as in the previous cases, it was dismissed for the charge said to Donnelly:

"Go out and keep the good work up. Shoot each other all you want to and the sooner we get rid of gang leaders in Brooklyn the better it will be for the police and the people."

Donnelly was a lieutenant of "Wild" Bill Lovett when the Lovett

gang terrorized Brooklyn eight years ago. Their racket was the extortion to tribute from stevedores employed along the docks and control of the gambling in the district.

After Lovett's murder in a gang hangout, Donnelly shared leadership with Eddie McGuire until another shooting removed McGuire. The rise of Eddie Martin eclipsed Donnelly's rule until Martin in turn was killed.

Four men were arrested Tuesday night charged with complicity in the slaying. All four denied any knowledge of the crime.

ELK, PROTECTED BY LAW, STAGE RAIDS ON HAY

Sheridan, Wyo. (AP)—Two instincts are battling with each other as the last great herds of wild elk to roam the west forsake their mountain refuge.

Hunger is winning. The fear of the hunter's rifle is being subordinated during the winter's survival fight.

From every direction, out of the hills they come, congregating in herds of from 300 to 400. At night they steal close to the ranches, tear down the fences, and lay waste the hay. At dawn they are fed; again the mountains hide them.

Elk steaks are out of season. The rancher's rifle hangs idly on the wall, while he reports to the game commissioner his loss. Helplessly he repairs the broken corral fences and saves the best of the trampled hay.

Even the rancher's back yard is not safe, if a stem of hay or other food is there. The elk "crashes" the fences, and their wild blows make the children tremble.

Owen Hoge, manager of the Horseshoe ranch in the Big Horn district said the elk's raids had begun much earlier than usual. This foretold a shortage of food in the hills, and a hard winter for those animals which depend upon random bits of frozen foliage.
