VALLEY AGAIN NEARS NORMAL AFTER STORMS

Jefferson—The combined forces of rain and snow caused a miniature flood in the street of Jefferson Wednesday and made it hard for pedestrians to get about. The weather began to moderate the first of the week. At first the sleet gave promise of a silver thaw but it soon turned to rain to the delight of everyone excepting the young folks, whose skating and skating were spoiled.

Monmouth—William Riddell, using his tractor and a huge road scraper, cleared some of the roads west of the girls' dormitory, but broke down before he could clear all of the impassable snow blockades. Some of the residents of this district are again receiving mail delivery service for the first time since the snow storm. The large county tractor is to clear the remaining roads within a few days, as service is impossible with the roads in the present condition.

Hopville—The Buena Vista school was opened again Monday after being closed a week because of cold weather. The teacher, Mrs. Sohn, had been unable to get to school.

Labish Center—The attendance at the Labish school has again reached its 100 per cent Monday when several pupils living long distances from the school returned.

At present all pupils can reach the school although the highway is still slick. The school did not close as the attendance was comparatively high since many of the pupils live near the school house.

Scio—Scarcity of water in Scio, especially on the south side, has worked a hardship on those who do not have wells, as the city water system has not been functioning well on the south side, owing to frozen mains and pipes.

Freezing of pipes and impairment of the pumping system at the city water plant as a result of cold weather have occupied the serious attention of the Scio town council during the severe weather. Radical changes are being considered for the prevention of a similar situation in future.
