

SEWELL T. ISOM, OF PIONEER DAY TAKEN IN LINN

Albany—Sewell T. Isom, 90, early Oregon pioneer, died Tuesday at his home near Brownsville. Funeral services were held Thursday from the Presbyterian church with burial in the Crawfordville cemetery.

He was born August 24, 1835 at Independence, Va., where he grew to manhood. Isom came to Oregon in 1872, locating near Brownsville. Isom married Rosa Edwards in 1858. Ten children were born to them. Mrs. Isom died in 1891. Later Mr. Isom married Sarah Worthington. There were ten children by the second marriage. He is survived by his widow and 15 children, 24 grandchildren and 32 great grandchildren.
