DEATH CLOSES ACTIVE LIFE OF NONAGENERIAN

Losing an eye during the second day of the fight between Union and Confederate soldiers at Port Donald, going home to be nursed back to health and then re-enlisting for the duration of the struggle between the North and the South, is but a part of the history of the life of William Unruh, nonagenerian, who recently passed away at the home of his granddaughter, Mrs. A. L. Smith, Dallas.

Unruh, who was one of a family of 12 children, was born 90 years ago in Delaware. Four of the family survive him, two sisters and two brothers. While he was quite young his parents moved to Germantown, Pa., and from there to Illinois where he spent his youth on a farm.

Shortly after the outbreak of the Civil war he enlisted as a private in Co. F, 21st regiment of Illinois volunteers and was in the thick of the fighting until he was incapacitated at Port Donald.

Determined to get back into the struggle, he again persuaded recruiting officers to accept him and enlisted in Co. A, 20th regiment of Illinois Veterans Infantry. He was mustered out for the last time June 2, 1893.

Unruh married Maggie Bainter in Colorado in 1892. For a great many years he and his wife lived on a small farm near Newberg. It was while living there that he lost the sight from his remaining eye. This tragedy failed to make him despondent and he continued cheerful and bright mentally up to the time of his death.

J. F. Unruh of Salem, and Albert A. Unruh of Portland are the surviving brothers. The two living sisters, Mrs. W. G. Windle and Mrs. W. G. Wright live in Indiana, while his widow continues to reside on the small farm.

HUBBARD GIRL SENDS EPISTLE FROM INDIA
