

SIMMONS RITES ARE WEDNESDAY AT SCIO CHURCH

Scio—Funeral services for Johnathan A. Simmons, 46, were held at the Christian church in Scio Wednesday afternoon and burial was in the Franklin Butte cemetery beside the grave of his brother William, who died in this city about 18 years ago. Rev. Albyn Eason of Albany preached the sermon, N. C. Lowe officiating as funeral director.

The tragic death of Mr. Simmons occurred last Saturday as a result of an injury to his head by a falling limb while working in the timber on a farm near Scio. Ora Zink, A. T. Powell and George Scott were with Simmons at the time. The injured man was brought to Scio, where the wound was dressed and the patient was taken back to the farm. The accident occurred at 10:30 o'clock and he died at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, having been unconscious most of the time after the injury.

He was born at Lymanstown, Idaho, July 29, 1883, but had resided near Scio for several years. Survivors of the immediate family are the widow and the four daughters, Mrs. Pearly Zink, Ottilie, Lillian and Vernice Simmons. Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Simmons, parents of the deceased, reside in Scio.

Mrs. John Anglesey, sister of the deceased, Ed Anglesey and wife, and Kenneth Simmons and wife came from Rigby, Idaho for the funeral.
