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She was trying to make a French dressing such as her neighbor made. But all her experiments with familiar seasonings failed to give her the right flavor until she thought of sugar. And a dash of sugar was just what was missing!



If you ever try to copy something you have eaten somewhere, and it doesn't taste the way you know it should, give a thought to sugar.

A dash of sugar will work wonders in the making of salad dressings or piquant sauces. In broiling or roasting meats, in vegetable cookery, nothing will take the place of a little sugar in securing or developing a pleasing flavor. Many of the popular French dishes include sugar, added during the cooking process.

A quick test for finding the flavor value of sugar is to mix a pinch of it with a pinch of salt. Taste it — there's no better flavor. Use such a combination of

sugar and salt in cooking vegetables. It will ideally heighten the flavor of peas, corn, spinach, carrots and tomatoes. Baste lamb chops as they broil with this mixture — 3/4 teaspoonful salt, 1 teaspoonful vinegar, 1 teaspoonful sugar, and 5 tablespoonfuls salad oil.
