IRISH RESERVE FORCE NEARLY COMPLETED

Dublin (UP)—Government circles are entertaining great hopes regarding the future success of the new Army Reserve force. Recruiting for the cadet corps in the National university, where some students recently riotously demonstrated against their new move, has proved very satisfactory, the list of vacancies being now almost filled. Similar recruiting plans have been started in Trinity college with the approval of the Provost and the college authorities.

As to the reserve, there has been a big rush to join the rank and file, but the army authorities are only accepting the best. It has become apparent that a very fine type of citizen soldier can be obtained by having the reserves called up for winter instead of summer training, as was the British practice.

The thought of joining an army reserve does not appeal to the town worker in a steady job, and for this reason the old British militia was recruited largely from an undesirable class. On the other hand, there is little to do on the land during the winter months and good men can be spared. The army authorities have made the experiment of trying to attract the hardy respectable young laborer and the sons of farmers who are land workers, and in this they have succeeded beyond their expectations.

"We started in Templemore, County Tipperary," said the cabinet minister in an interview with the United Press, "and we are getting

the very best types of citizen soldiers; farmers' sons and farm laborers in good employment form the vast majority, and in fact the recruiting is so brisk that we can afford to pick and choose, and only take the best types.

"We have got half a battalion in that district on the understand-

ing that they will not be called up for training before November any year unless their services are required in an emergency."
