## FORUM SENDS MEN TO TALK, BRUSH CREEK

Brush Creek—The Booster's club held an exceptionally interesting meeting at Brush Creek school house Friday evening.

Three members of the Silverton chamber of commerce drove out for the evening and spoke to the boosters. Norris Ames, president of the chamber, outlined the program that the chamber of commerce had planned for this year. Ames told who were on the various committees and talked on the plans of the chamber to endeavor to establish a co-operative creamery some time in the future.

Ames also urged local farmers to grow more products for the Silverton cannery so that it would not have to go elsewhere for its fruit. He suggested that the Booster club appoint different members each month to meet with the chamber of commerce to let club members all become interested and know the plans of the Silverton business and professional men. Dan Hillman and J. C. Goplerud were appointed the two who would meet with the chamber of commerce in March.

H. B. Latham, also of the Silverton chamber of commerce, spoke briefly on dairying and the economic situation. T. M. Lukens, the third chamber of commerce representative, endorsed the statements of the former two speakers.

Other members of the program Friday night consisted of music by the school children and a yodelling solo by Fred Krug.

At the business meeting the matter of purchasing a curtain was discussed but it was finally decided that the club needed paint more than a stage curtain at the present time. It is the plan of the club to paint the stage and the matter of securing the paint and having the work done was left in the hands of the board of directors. Improving the driveway into the school grounds was also discussed. This too, was left to the board.

## FORTY MEDALS ARE GIVEN MEN OF GUARD UNIT

Silverton—Company I, 162nd Infantry of Silverton won 40 medals at their rifle range this last season, 13 for experts, nine for sharpshooters, and 18 for marksmanship.

The following members fired the course with Colts automatic A5: Capt. Hutton 70, 5-7; Lt. Davenport 85, 1-7; First Sgt. Levett 87, 2-7; Sgt. Kellner 85, 1-7; Sgt. Olsen 93, 2-7; Sgt. Hannan 94, 4-7; Corp. Cross 86, 2-7; and Pvt. Vislar 69, 6-7. Those who shot the Browning automatic rifle on the 200 and 300 yard course of 500 points were Lt. Davenport 420; Sgt. Kellner 350; Sgt. Olsen 444; Corp. Cross 372.

The two high scores in prone positions rapid fire were made by Lt. Davenport, 26 bulls eyes, eleven 4's and three 3's, a score of 183. Sgt. Olsen made 31 bulls eyes, five 4's and two 3's, a score of 191. Both scores of 40 shots each were fired in one minute at 22 yards.

The following shot the Springfield United States caliber 30 rifle firing course: "D" 250 points, Capt. Hutton 210; First Lt. Davenport 224; 2nd Lt. Lee Alfred 190; Sgt. Olsen 243, Corp. E. Johnson 233, Sgt. Hannan 228, Corp. Cross 225, Sgt. Kellner 224, Corp. Anderson 223, Corp. Levett 217, Pvt. Larson 215, Sgt. Scott 214, Pvt. J. Paulson 214, Pvt. Hansen 209, Pvt. Levett 203, Pvt. Schenk 204, Pvt. Wagner 204, Pvt. Foster 202, Pvt. Sliff 198, Pvt. Williams 196, Pvt. Balme 196, Pvt. Johnson 195, Pvt. McMillan 192.

The three high scores prone were made by Capt. Hutton 49, Sgt. Olsen 50, Corp. Johnson 49, out of a possible 50.

Three perfect scores, rapid firing were made by Sgt. Hannan, Sgt. Olsen and Corp. Johnson, 10 shots in one minute, position, standing to sitting.

This makes the best range work done by this company and arrangements are under way to make 1930 a still better year.

Twelve prizes are going to the 12 high men firing the course before going to the camp this summer. Capt. Hutton is range officer and Sgt. Olsen instructor.

Range firing starts in March and a month will be spent in instruction work after which record firing will be held.
